Mr. and Mrs. Howard Rogers are the parents of a baby girl born Saturday at the Lemon Nursing Home in Caldwell.

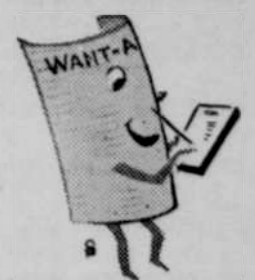

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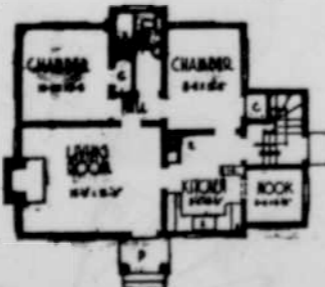
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
