Boise Fair Prizes Over \$13,000

Cash prizes to be awarded to winning exhibitors at the Western Idaho State Fair to be held in Boise August 25th to 29th inclusive, total \$13,000. This figure is about \$3,000 greater than the amount paid in prizes in the first renewal of the Fair last year and does not include the prizes which will be given in horse racing and rodeo events. Fair managers state that the premiums offered compare very well with those offered at other important fairs.

Prizes are offered in thirteen divisions, with dairy cattle receiving \$3,453; horses \$1,594; beef cattle \$1,787.50; swine \$1,396; sheep \$358; poultry \$453; farm products \$2,228; and fruit \$452. Women's crafts will be awarded with \$499 for fine arts, \$110 for flowers and \$107 for pantry and kitchen products. Future Farmers of American will receive \$322 and a very substantial sum has been reserved for boys' and girls' clubs.

Prizes are completely listed in a 48 page booklet of rules and regulations which is now being distributed throughout Idaho or which may be obtained by writing to Ed L. Sproat, Fair Manager, in Boise.

New construction is being rushed to completion at the Fair Grounds and all projects will be finished well in advance of the opening day of the Fair, assuring plenty of room and accommodations for all exhibitors, of which there will be many more than last year. Some of the exhibition buildings have been doubled in size, and two new buildings are already completed.
