All work projects are carefully supervised for safety conditions and the most dangerous are especially studied and regulated to eliminate any hazards. Blasting is generally done under the supervision of a competent and thoroughly experienced blaster who usually loads and fires all shots using only electric blasting caps. All precautions such as testing caps warnings, signs, etc. are rigidly observed.
