U. S. Army to Build More Motorized Balloons



Tests of a new type of motorized balloon, 100 feet long, with a capacity of 58,000 cubic feet at Scott field, Ill., over a six months period have resulted in a decision by the War department to construct more of them. The balloons can travel 40 miles per hour under their own power. When anchored to trucks, as shown above, they can be used for observation purposes.
