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Payette To Play On Local Field; Lose To Ontario

Nyssa's one-run defeat jinx followed the team to Ontario Sunday where they lost another game by a one run margin, this time by a 4 to 5 count when Ontario broke a tie in the last half of the ninth inning.

The locals got off to a fine start, taking advantage of Ontario errors and nicking Ault for three hits to score four runs the first inning, but this ended the scoring for the locals. Ontario scored three in the third inning on two singles, a sacrifice and a triple; they went ahead and knotted the score in the sixth.

Ontario scored the winning run the last half of the ninth, when the first man up got to first on what some fans and players called an error on the base umpire, none other than Charley Newbill. The second man up got to first when Max Schweizer at second made a fine stop, but his throw was a little slow to catch the runner, and Ontario had runners roosting on both first and second with none down. Dean Johnston pitched himself out of the hole by retiring the next two batters via the strikeout route. The next man lifted a high fly to right field for what was supposed to be the third out, but Ernest McClure lost the ball in the sun momentarily and dropped the ball, letting a runner score with the winning tally.

The one-run jinx started for Nyssa on May 16 when they lost to Ontario 3 to 4. The next Sunday they lost to Boise, again by a 3 to 4 count. June 6th the boys played at Caldwell and lost 6 to 7 after going into the 9th with a 3 to 6 lead. The team lost to Vale July 11 by a 2 to 1 score, lost to Emmett 5 to 4 in 10 innings July 25th and last Sunday to Ontario 5 to 4.

The game Sunday was a splendid pitchers battle between Johnston and Ault, with Nyssa making 5 hits and Ontario six. In the absence of John Young, the vacancy behind the bat was amply filled by George Johnston, with Hack Wilson taking George's position at third base.

Payette Beats Boise

Boise was knocked off their league leadership perch Sunday when Payette scored a 7 to 6 victory over the capitol city nine. This put Boise, Payette, Vale and Ontario in a four way tie for league leadership. Vale defeated Caldwell 5 to 4 at Redco park in Caldwell and Emmett is to play at Weiser tonight in game under Weiser's newly installed lights.

Payette Here Sunday

Local ball fans will have an opportunity to see Payette in action against the locals on the home lot Sunday. In a game played at Payette early in June, the Idaho team won 9 to 0 but in this game the locals made more hits than the winners. Fresh from their victory over Boise, the Payette team will be all steamed up to get over the Nyssa obstacle; but the local boys feel it is about time to get over the one-run defeat jinx, and knock over some of the leaders to show they have a better team than the record shows. Paed by Dean Johnston, the best pitcher in the league, the boys owe Dean some good runs and they feel Sunday would be a good time to go out and collect ten or a dozen for their pitching star.

JUNIOR LEAGUE TEAM WINS FROM HOOD RIVER

In a game played prior to the Idaho-Oregon League game Sunday at Ontario, the American Legion Junior team from Malheur county defeated a similar team from Hood River, 7 to 9. Raymond Graham and D. Mausing played on the Malheur team, and will go with the group to play for state championship at Woodburn later this month.

JACK RUST NAMED AS ASSISTANT AT GAME FARM

Jack Rust has been named assistant at the state game farm located between Ontario and Nyssa; and will have charge of hatching work. The new farm is located slightly over a mile west of the highway and about midway between Ontario and Nyssa.

FIRST OF SMALLPOX CLINICS NEXT TUESDAY

Mrs. Edna Flanagan Farris, county health nurse, urged parents this week not to forget the smallpox clinics, the first of which will be held next Tuesday, August 10, for all children outside the Nyssa proper school district at 9:00 a. m. at the high school.

This is part of the campaign being waged in the county to reduce deaths and disabilities due to communicable diseases, and all children from six months of age to through the high school age group should attend.

To insure seeing the doctor all planning to attend should come as early as possible, bringing twenty-five cents to cover cost of materials.

Duck Season To Last 30 Days

Duck hunters will be subject to the same tight restrictions and 30-day shooting season this fall that have bound them for the past two years. The season in Oregon, in the intermediate zone, lasts from November 1 to 30.

This season's regulations, approved by President Roosevelt and announced Sunday by the department of agriculture, again prohibits the killing of wood ducks, canvasbacks, ruddy ducks, redheads, buffheads, swans and Ross' geese.

Zone Boundaries Altered

About the only changes from last season are sections shifting states from one hunting one to another, raising the daily bag and possession limit on geese and brant from 4 to 5, increasing the bag limit on coot from 15 to 25 and reducing the limit on sora rails from 25 to 15.

"The regulations represent the continuance of a program that has checked the decline of waterfowl and resulted in an increase in numbers," biological survey authorities said. "Reports indicate there has been a noticeable increase in most species for the second year in succession."

"The increases are not great enough now to warrant any lengthening of the season or removal of other restrictions."

Limit Remains at 10

The daily bag and possession limit on ducks remains at 10 in the aggregate.

Baiting of water fowl and doves and the use of live decoys are forbidden.

The three-shell limit on repeating shotguns is continued and hunters will be permitted to use shotguns no larger than No. 10 gauge.

All waterfowl and coot shooting must be done between 7 a. m. and 4 p. m. although snipe, rails, gallinules, woodcock, mourning dove, white-winged doves and band tailed pigeons may be hunted until sunset.

In the intermediate zone are Idaho, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

Possession of a federal duck stamp, sold at postoffices, is required of every migratory waterfowl hunter over 16 years of age.

A young fellow who promises to be as good or better than his dad as a service station operator arrived in Nyssa Tuesday evening at the Lawrence home. He was pretty heavy for his age, tipping the beam at 10 pounds; and has been named after his father, Ralph Glenn Lawrence, Jr.

Two nurses are on duty at the Lawrence home and no visitors are allowed as yet; but friends are hopeful of better reports within a few days.

VISIT UNCLE IN NYSSA

Mr. Rice is an uncle of Mr. Gipson and Mrs. Atkins. Mr. Atkins is an oil operator in Oklahoma and had just made a visit at Sun Valley prior to coming to Nampa to stay a few days at the Gipson home.

The Louis P. Thomas car was badly damaged in a collision early Sunday morning at the Pete Tensen corner northwest of Nyssa. Another driver, whose identity was not learned, hit the rear of the Thomas machine, causing it to turn over. Mr. Thomas received a sprained shoulder in the mishap.

92 Bu. Yield Reported

Ninety two bushels of Federation wheat to the acre is a record yield made by Lynn Kygar of the Owyhee community. This record was made on a three acre plot which had been a hog lot for many years and was in excellent shape. His entire wheat crop of 8 acres went 77 bushels average, which in itself is an exceptional yield.

Grain yields have been good this year and surprisingly good yields have been experienced on new land, many fields averaging from 30 to 35 bushels for the first crop from sagebrush, and practically all wheat sold has been No. 1 grade.

The Journal would be interested in receiving information as to crop yields as there are many people interested in the Owyhee project and want to know what our wonderful land here will produce.

Parking Lot To Be Lighted

Nyssa shoppers especially those who patronize Nyssa on Saturday night will be pleased to learn that arrangements have been made to provide more parking space. The Jack McConnell lots west of the Norcott Service station are being lighted with flood lights, the weeds cleaned off and a very serviceable lot provided for the convenience of shoppers.

New Farm Crops and Practices Seen On Farm Tour Monday and Tuesday

The dawn of a new day in Malheur county agriculture was seen by a crowd numbering close to one hundred which attended the farm tour Monday and Tuesday. A few years back practically every field would have been hay, grain or corn. Now fields of sugar beets, lima beans, crested wheat grass, strawberry and ladina clover, hybrid seed corn, and other crops are coming into prominence, besides the staple crops of hay and grain.

The tour started Monday near Weiser, with a caravan of cars winding its way over the northern part of the project, led by County Agent Larson. New farm practices and new crops were inspected, including sugar beet fields, a 4-H cattle project, seed corn fields; with the noon stop being made under the trees in the Vale park.

Monday afternoon the caravan of farmers and business men saw the fine farms around Vale, including a five acre tract of soy beans. This is a new crop here and the likely yield was estimated at around 30 bushels to the acre. However it was pointed out that soy beans were not an especially profitable crop under present price conditions.

Tour Near Nyssa Tuesday

The tour started Tuesday morning at the Cairo junction, with alfalfa experiments being shown an interested group of farmers and business men of the county. An inspection of the alfalfa fields was made, and the alfalfa was found to be in good condition. The tour then continued to the Vale park, where a fine field of beets on the Morastacia place were inspected and questions answered by experts on the crop. The Morastacias came from Colorado last spring and are farming part of the K. S. & D. holdings.

Crested wheat grass, laying in bundles from the binder and piled in windrows were inspected at the Pete Tensen farm. The crop was planted in September 1935, and a yield of 225 pounds to the acre was harvested last year. The crop this year was estimated at 750 pounds to the acre, and seed is worth 35c a pound at the present time.

Crested wheat grass is a superior drought resistant range grass and much in demand for range planting.

Bonds Approved By Nyssa Voters

Voters of Nyssa authorized the council to proceed and issue bonds not to exceed \$7,500 for city hall purposes and bonds not to exceed \$1,000 for city park purposes at the election held Tuesday. Vote was conclusive, being 85 to 6 in favor of building a city hall and 81 to 10 in favor of the park project.

No location has been selected as yet for the city hall, but the council has many sites under consideration and will likely be able to announce a choice within a short time. It is hoped that details will be completed so the hall can be built and completed in time for early fall occupancy.

The new hall will contain council rooms, city recorders office, space for storage of fire equipment, jail, library and other features as the plans develop.

A site for a city park is likewise under discussion and no decision made regarding a location. The council will seek to get PWA labor to aid in the project in the hopes that a park will actually be under construction next spring, with most of the leveling work being done this fall and winter.

Idaho Power To Have Office Here

Announcement was made this week by L. W. Brainard, division manager of the Idaho Power company that a lease arrangement had been made with Bernard Frost to open Idaho Power offices in part of the new Frost building now under construction.

Under terms of the lease, the front part of the building will be altered slightly from original plans to allow for maximum show window space and the interior is being arranged to comply with the Idaho Power Company's needs.

An effort has been made for some time to get a permanent Idaho Power office in Nyssa and when the opportunity presented itself in the way of a suitable location, the company was glad to make this improvement for the convenience of their Nyssa patrons, Mr. Brainard stated.

Water Mains To Be Extended On Nyssa East Side

Extension of water for fire and domestic purpose to portions of the residence section east of the tracks was the principal new business transacted at the council meeting Monday evening. Authority was given to lay approximately 3 blocks of 4 inch pipe and install a fire hydrant which will have the effect of amply serving the east side of the tracks. This will put the fire hydrant in the approximate center of the residential district and in case of necessity, water can be used on any fire in the section. Water users will also connect onto the line for domestic and high pressure irrigation purposes.

The council acted favorably on the application of Virgil Johnson of Vale to survey the sidewalk improvements contemplated and Mr. Johnson will soon have quantities and other items figured so bids for the work can be asked. If possible it is hoped to have the sidewalk leading to the school house improved before the first day of school.
