He said the time was coming when sugar content would likely be increased by at least 50 per cent, along with increased tonnage and more profits for both growers and processors.

Seed Laws Discussed

Prof. G. R. Hyslop, head of the plant industry department of Oregon State College led a discussion of the new seed laws now in effect and predicted these laws would assist in combating the noxious weed problem. Under the law, all seed must be labeled as to grower and content. Seed must be tested for foreign matter, which testing will be done by the Oregon State College; but Prof. Hyslop urged care in getting good samples to be sent for testing. Seed containing noxious weeds cannot be sold under the law.

Seed Corn Viewed

A field of hybrid seed corn being grown under contract with the Sioux Seed Company was viewed at the Bill DeGroff farm. This corn is planted 6 rows to hybrid corn, and two rows of pollinating rows throughout the field. Price this fall is based on 1 1/2 times Chicago corn price in December, plus 20c per bushel.

In answer to question regarding his experience in beet growing last year, Mr. DeGroff said he thought beets were a profitable crop and that his best acreage last year was 23 acres which averaged 30 tons to the acre. Cost of growing and harvesting beets came to \$42 an acre. His total acreage of around 100 acres averaged 22 tons to the acre.

Mr. DeGroff turned 1800 lambs onto the tops last year, putting them into the field weighing 51 pounds and sold them two months later at 80c per pound. Beet tops, pasture and some hay was the feed used, and he figured they made a net of 90c per lamb. He also showed the group a six acre pasture containing orchard grass, meadow fescue, ladina clover and other ingredients which had carried 19 head of stock all summer and had been cut for hay once; and had been slighted for water besides.

Strawberry clover was examined at a small plot near the Langton Service station, which clover is recommended for alkali soils. The plot was planted a short time ago and plants were just getting a good start. Ladina clover across the road on slightly alkali soil was also examined and explained.

The tour ended at the Sparks farm in Big Bend where County Agent Larsen explained the results of an alkali experiment plot which he started 8 years ago. In an effort to find varieties resistant to wilt, several dozen varieties were planted, one variety to a row. At the present time many varieties had completely disappeared, notably among these being French, Argentine, Austria, southern U. S., Utah common, and other varieties. The varieties which seemed able to withstand wilt and were in flourishing condition were various types of Russian alfalfa.

The farm tour held Monday and Tuesday is an annual affair and each year sees more interest and greater attendance. This year the Amalgamated Sugar Company and The Sioux City Seed Company cooperated with County Agent Larsen in arranging and making the tour possible.
