VALE CONTRACTOR GETS

SUN RIVER PROJECT JOB

The contract for construction of laterals and canal structures on the Sun River Slope Division of the Sun River Federal Reclamation Project in Montana has been awarded by cretary of the Interior, Harold L. Ickes, to Otis Williams and Company of Vale, Oregon, on a bid of \$65,773.80.

The successful bid was the lowest of nine proposals received by the Bureau of Reclamation at its Fairfield, Montana, office July 8.

The Sun River Slope Divison of the project is only partly completed, although for several years 2,688 acres have been under irrigation there. In all, the plans call for addition of 14,345 acres to this division, and the larger part of this acreage will be served by the canals to be built under this contract.

The contractor will begin work within 30 days and must complete the job in 400 calendar days thereafter

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
