Stage Set For Caldwell Night Rodeo Aug. 19 to 21

Expectations that the tops in bronc riders and bulldoggers in America will compete for purses in the annual Homesteaders' Jubilee night rodeo in Caldwell August 19, 20 and 21, were booming this week as festive preparations for the celebration pushed steadily forward.

Colborn and Sorensen, managers of the rodeo which plays annually at Madison Square Garden in New York City and at which world's champion bronc riders are crowned, will be in charge again this year of the night rodeo in Caldwell.

Performances will be given at 8:15 o'clock each night, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A parade, featuring rodeo performers and floats entered by Caldwell business firms and surrounding communities will be conducted at 7 o'clock the evening of the first day. Community clubs and individuals have been invited to enter floats in the parade with cash prizes offered in two divisions, individually decorated automobiles and community or club floats.

Kids Parade Set

The kids' parade will give the youngsters an opportunity to star on the second evening, Friday, August 20. It will have nine divisions, aggregating a total of \$60 in prizes.

Purses totaling \$1850 will intrigue the rodeo contestants. Charles Laursen, Chamber of Commerce secretary, said. Six championships, one of them for residents of southwestern Idaho and eastern Oregon only, will be determined during the three days' contest.

Crowns for both saddle and bareback bronc riding championships will be awarded. Prize money will be given for the best performance each day and also for a final showing based on the elimination contests scheduled the third day of the show for bronc riding.

Championship will be offered in addition in steer wrestling, calf roping and brahma steer riding. The first two contest awards will total \$405, while a \$150 purse is the total prize for the brahma steer riding contest.

Special Events

Special events in which prizes aggregate \$300, include wild horse racing, wild cow milking contest and a hide race. Awards will go to the best local bucking horse, to the best man and outfit in the grand entry parade and to the best woman and outfit in the grand entry.

Among individual performers on hand for the show are famous trick ropers, many of whom were in the

Caldwell show last year, and Don Wilcox, Tulsa, Okla., trick rider. Jasbo Fulkerson of Fort Worth, Texas, will return to delight big crowds with his new clown tricks this year.

A general admission ticket will be sufficient for spectator's seat. There will be no reserved seats, either in the grandstand or bleachers. All seats are close to the arena and offer spectators equally good views of the show.

RECORD CROP OF HAY BEING HARVESTED AT CHASE FARM ON PROJECT

Proof of what new land will do when it comes to producing alfalfa hay can be seen at the Mrs. F. M. Chase farm on the new project southwest of Nyssa. The first and second crops have yielded a strong 6 ton, and a total of from 8 to 9 tons to the acre is expected from the three cuttings of the 80 acre field.

Jim Boor and his crew have been putting up the second cutting, using two mowers, a side delivery rake and a bunch rake; and the hay is so heavy the side delivery can only pile one swath of the mower in a row making it necessary to have an extra man to throw it over. Jim says that after cutting it is hard to tell where the mower went along, the hay is so thick.

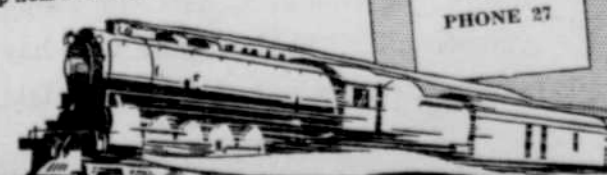
