The Name Martello

The name Martello comes from Martello bay, Corsica, where, in 1794, a single defense tower held off an English fleet for several hours. The earliest known towers were built by the Mesopotamian peoples for religious purposes. The Egyptians and Greeks had a few such structures, but the defense tower did not come into its own until the time of the Romans. They built towers on the city walls, on gates, and even on houses. During the Middle Ages each noble family maintained a tower as a place of refuge in time of war. These were very high and often isolated, with a small entrance.

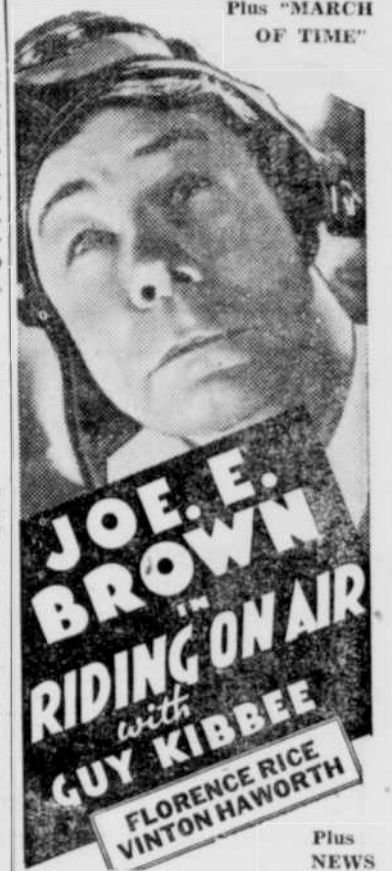

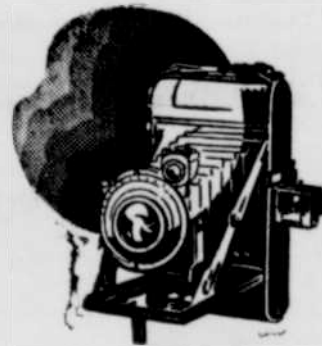
