It Happened In Nyssa Years Ago
Interesting bits of history gleaned from the files of years ago.

Taken From The Gate City Journal Friday, September 10, 1926

Monday, September 20, was the date fixed for the caucus of nominated candidates for city offices, the meeting to be held in the Nyssa Opera house.

Two large stacks of hay containing 150 tons were burned on the E. O. Land Co. pipe line farm about 5 miles from Nyssa last Friday. Spontaneous combustion is believed to have caused the conflagration.

A. H. Wilson has leased the Lafrenz building near the depot and it is understood will conduct a lunch counter.

Victor Marshall and wife had an auto accident at Apple Valley Sunday evening while returning to their home in Wilder after spending the day at Nyssa.

The highest price yet received by local growers for this season's apples was reported this week when between 15 and 20 cars were contracted in the Apple Valley section at \$50 per ton, orchard run for Jonathans and \$60 per ton for Delicias.

Introducing the Moss Family

This week we take pleasure in introducing to our readers Mr. James W. Moss and family. Their farm is located a little south and about a mile west of the cemetery.

Mr. Moss left Nebraska because of crop failures, went to Alberta, Canada, with his family and left Canada for Nyssa because of his wife's health. Mr. Moss did dry farming in Nebraska and decided that in order to be sure of successful crops, he must be in an irrigated country.

After renting a farm here for a year, he decided that this was a very good and profitable country to farm. He immediately bought an 89 acre farm under the Owyhee project and this spring built a house and cultivated the land for the first time with the intention of making this his definite home. He is planting the entire farm in alfalfa and clover. Although he was a tractor farmer in the middle west, he uses horses here exclusively because he says he finds it cheaper to raise feed here than to keep a tractor.

There are four in the family, Mr. Moss, his wife with their son Jimmy standing in front, their married daughter, Maxine and Mrs. Moss's father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Elfritz who are spending the winter here.

4-H Club Members Prepare Exhibits For County Fair

4-R Club members over Malheur County are putting the final polish on beef and horn, the last bit of ribbon and lace on dainty garments, sewing guarding their best corn or largest vegetables, and having a final try at bread-making or cake-making in preparation for exhibiting their best work at the County Fair on September 4, 5, and 6.

Demonstration teams, judging teams, style revue contestants and those entering the Dollar Dinner contests are holding their final practices in order to be prepared to take part in the various activities scheduled for the three days of the fair.

Members of the Malheur 4-H Leaders' Council are busy with preparations to make the 4-H Club's part of this year's fair the biggest and best it has ever been. A committee under the leadership of Mrs. E. V. Allstrom of Grove is charged with the responsibility of preparing and arranging a "Central Idea" exhibit booth dealing with 4-H projects, and Mrs. T. B. Duncan of Vale is Chairman of a committee to handle the 4-H concession booth.

Other local leaders are planning details of the various contests to make them as attractive and interesting as possible. Mrs. H. A. Conner of Annex will handle the style revue, Miss Joy Crummett of Ontario is in charge of the Dollar Dinner Contest and Mrs. Victoria Schweizer of Owyhee will direct the Demonstration contest. Mrs. C. C. Cotton of Kingman Kolony will be in charge of the Rose and Flower exhibits. Doris Klingback of Owyhee will help with the Clothing and Cooking exhibits, while James Nichols of Kingman Kolony will arrange the crops exhibits. C. P. Yundt of Oregon Slope will be in charge of all livestock exhibits and contests.

Persons who would like to attend the fair during the day need not stay away for lack of something interesting to see as the 4-H Club activities throughout the three days will provide plenty of entertainment Saturday morning will be devoted to getting all exhibits in place and putting the finishing touches on the livestock. On Saturday afternoon the exhibits will be judged and prizes awarded.

The Style Revue will also be held this first day of the fair, the contestants being judged starting at 1 p. m. and a parade will be held and awards announced upon completion of the judging.

Two Dollar Dinner contestants, one from Oregon Trail and one from Annex will compete on Sunday, one being scheduled from 10:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. and the other from 3:00 p. m. to 6:00 p. m., then at 7:00 p. m., immediately preceding the rodeo, is scheduled the livestock parade.

Monday will be an exceptionally full day with the Demonstration Contest, the Health Contest, and the Livestock Judging Contest scheduled for 10:00 a. m. and the Livestock Pitting and Showmanship Contest taking place at 2:00 p. m.

Introduced Kindergartens
The German educator Froebel, who introduced the kindergarten system which bears his name, was born in 1782 and died in 1852.
