

Local Edwin Booths In Church Play

One of the most thrilling plays ever heard in Court will be presented at the Nyssa Methodist Church on Monday night, September 13, when twenty-one prominent local citizens from the various churches present the widely heralded "murder trial" entitled, "Prisoner At the Bar." Trial begins promptly at 8.00 p. m.

The trial deal with a young man, Haywarr H. Johnson, who under the influence of liquor has "killed" his wife and left three motherless children. Mr. Johnson is then "tried" for murder. The drama tells the story of the returned soldier, influenced by wet repeal propaganda and trapped by the modern liquor sales system. ply and duty, the attorneys battling brilliantly for a life at stake, the fingerprint expert, the jury spellbound by the unfolding drama are among the gripping incidents of this tremendously impressive and effective temperance play. Admission to the trial will be free. A voluntary offering will be taken. The trial is being sponsored by the churches throughout the state, and everyone is invited to attend. This is the first appearance of this trial in Nyssa and a large crowd is expected to fill the Methodist Church if the citizens of Nyssa attend the drama as they have in other places. The trial has been given in Chicago, Washington, D. C. St. Louis, Minneapolis, Detroit, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and many other towns and cities before audiences as high as 3,500 people.

FOURTEEN STATES REQUIRE PERMITS

Fourteen states now require visiting tourists to obtain permits, either almost immediately upon entering the state or after an extended stay, according to the Oregon State Motor association.

Requirements of each of these states, as compiled by A.A.A. nat-

tional headquarters, were listed as follows:

ARIZONA—Permit must be secured within ten days after entering the state and displayed on the windshield; no fee, good for four months.

ARKANSAS—Permit required within thirty days; good for ninety days; no fee.

CALIFORNIA—Must be obtained within five days and displayed on the windshield; no fee.

IDAHO—Must register within forty-eight hours after entering the state; no fee.

LOUISIANA—Must be secured after thirty days; good for one hundred and twenty days; fee \$1.00.

MASSACHUSETTS—Tourists staying more than thirty days must secure a permit and file compliance with the state's compulsory insurance law.

MINNESOTA—Must register within ten days; no fee.

MISSISSIPPI—Permit required after twenty-five days; good for one hundred and twenty-five days; fee, \$1.00.

MONTANA—Tourists must stop at the first county seat and obtain a permit, which must be carried in plain sight in or upon the vehicle at all times; good for thirty days with additional thirty-day extension privilege; no fee.

NEVADA—Registration card and permit sticker for windshield must be obtained within ten days; good for three months; no fee.

OKLAHOMA—Permit required within ten days; good for sixty days; no fee.

OREGON—Must get permit at registration station within twenty-four hours after entering state; no fee.

TEXAS—Permit must be applied for with county tax collector within twenty-five days; good for one hundred and twenty days; fee, fifty cents.

UTAH—Must register within five days; no fee.
