that the city act as its own contractor in the matter of laying the sidewalks. Councilman Thompson brought out the fact that in as much as the city had an Engineer that he could act in that capacity for the work under consideration. Mr. Hardin the next lowest bidder, was very much in favor of such a move, sighting that he had proposed just such procedure before the council awarded the contract.

Sewer to be Extended

Councilman McClure laid his plan for the extension of the sewer before the council, which met with approval. It is planned to extend the sewer system from the Dilley house across th street and north about two blocks. This would take in the property, now under construction of W. E. Schreman and would serve as far north as Park street.

Cost to be Nominal

McClure's plan included the cost of the extension, which met with unanimous approval, not only of the council, but of the property owners present. The plan is to assess each property owner on a footage basis. It is estimated to be fifty cents per foot.

Special Session Called

A special session was called by the Mayor for Thursday, September 9 to consider the matter of the proposed sidewalks. And at that time to hear the report of City Engineer Virgil Johnson and the exact grades of the highway levels together with the estimated costs of the construction. Council adjourned at 12:30 a. m.
