Chamber of Commerce Hold Big Dinner Friday

Pep Meeting Held To Celebrate Building of Sugar Factory.

The Nyssa Chamber of Commerce last Friday night at the Eagles Hall, was host to officials of the Amalgamated Sugar Company, at a pleasant dinner in celebration of the announcement of the starting of the erection of the sugar factory, in Nyssa.

President Appoints Toastmaster

President Fletcher welcomed the visiting guests and pledged the support of the Chamber of Commerce to a policy of helping the farmers and the Amalgamated Sugar Company make a success of the factory. Mr. Fletcher took the opportunity to thank the committee on arrangements, for the splendid dinner and appointed Mr. Frank T. Morgan to act as toastmaster for the evening.

Calls on First Irrigation President

Mr. Morgan introduced the first President of the Owyhee Irrigation District which was formed in 1907. Various farmers of the valley were called on for expressions of their views. All were outspoken of their praise of the Amalgamated Sugar Company's policy with the farmer, and that the decision had been made to erect the factory in Nyssa, claiming that with its central location in the sugar beet farming section would in a lot of cases cut down the cost of hauling. As to the effect of the location of the factory in a community, one of the high lights of the many talks was one in which Mr. Pfeiler cited the case of the American Sugar Company building a factory where no town existed and today, around that factory is a city of ten thousand population, Oxnard, California.

Provisions of Sugar Bill

Mr. A. E. Benning of the Sugar Company explained features of the newly enacted sugar bill. One of the provisions being the matter of allotment of sugar beet acreage, such allotment being under the Secretary of Agriculture Wallace.

Building Program

Mr. Cole, Construction and Operating Manager, spoke of the building of the factory saying that if the weather permitted, that construction would continue this fall until the foundation was complete. And that next spring the steel work would be started and the factory completed in time for the fall run.

Others of Company Introduced

Other members of the Sugar company, introduced were Mr. Moore, purchasing agent; Mr. Hodge, engineer; and Mr. George Daley oldest field man, in point of service, in employ of the company; Mr. R. E. Whitaker, cashier and Mr. Schenberger, chief clerk.

At the regular monthly meeting of the council, city engineer, Virgil Johnson, turned in his report of the final cost of the sidewalk recently put in on the north side of Main Street.

Contractor Goes Under Contract

Contractor Hardin turned in his bill for the laying of the sidewalk for \$688.80, his original bid being \$754.80. The city's part of the construction is \$443.71.

Cost To Be Assessed

Cost of the construction of the sidewalk will be assessed directly to property owners of the lots abutting the sidewalk. This cost on a footage basis will be around \$36.00 per lot.

CCC Camp To Move To Baker

Baker Barracks Will Receive Large Number of Nyssa Enrollees.

Most of this company will be comprised of men from New York and New Jersey states.

OREGON POTATO GROWERS VOTE FOR NEW AAA GOALS

Oregon commercial potato growers who took the trouble to vote in the recent referendum election called by the AAA are in favor of establishing goals under the 1938 farm program, although a comparatively small percentage of them took the trouble to vote. The unofficial total was 303 for, and 178 against, in the 18 Oregon counties which are classified as commercial potato areas.

Three Counties Against Plan

In general the western Oregon counties were more in favor of the plan of setting up voluntary goals than were those in eastern Oregon. Among counties voting favorably were Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Hood River, Lincoln, Washington, Yamhill, Linn, Baker, Malheur, Marion, Multnomah, Umatilla and Union. Voting against the plan were growers in Klamath, Lane and Crook counties, although the latter by only a one-vote majority.

A.A.A. Compiling Results

The vote has been reported to Washington where returns from other producing states are being compiled. The AAA has announced that if a substantial majority is in favor of the plan it will be included in the 1938 agricultural conservation program. It would apply only to growers producing three acres or more and would be on a voluntary basis for them.

Regular Meetings Of Council Held Monday.

Adopting an ordinance for the refunding of street improvement bonds the Council at its regular monthly meeting also opened bids for those bonds that are to be in denominations of \$500 and carry six per cent interest and due October 1, 1942. Action on the bids was deferred to a later date.

After disposing of monthly bills and the bond ordinance the council voted to hold a budget meeting on Monday, October 18, each councilman to select one citizen to act on the Budget Committee.

County Court Holds Public Hearing Wednesday Afternoon.

At a public hearing held Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. in Vale, the County Court listened to a group of farmers, and business men from Nyssa, Vale and Ontario, give their sanction to the proposed issuance of road bonds in the amount of \$100,000.

Judge Graham Gives Purpose Of Meeting

County Judge Graham explicated to the meeting that the purpose of the Court in calling the meeting was to get some idea of the reaction of the people throughout the county, to the contemplated bond issue.

Judge Graham went over the road situation for the past seventeen years, recounting that since he had taken office the court had felt it necessary, during the depression years to cut the road levy. And that with the ruling against raising assessments more than six per cent in any one budget year he felt that the bonds would give the county good roads now rather than having to wait years for the assessments to rise to a point that would enable the county to put in good roads.

Attorney Asks For Committee

Robert Lytle, attorney of Vale, asked, in the form of a motion, that a committee be appointed, by the court for the purpose of working out a plan of allocation of the funds for certain specific roads. This committee would be composed of both farmers and business men from various localities of the county. The number to serve on the committee would be left to the judgment of the court, according to the motion.

Allocation Meets With Approval

The plan for allocation met with universal approval of all present, judging from the talks that were made by the farmers, especially.

Ontario Mayor Asks For Delay

Mayor Aiken of Ontario asked that the bond election be delayed until it could be determined from President Roosevelt whether the contemplated roads could be built with CCC labor. This plan was not favorable to the group, due to the fact that it would mean delay of building of the roads and the attitude of the government in frowning on the use of the three C's. This coupled with the opposition of a Road Builders Association against the use of such labor, made it apparent to those present that plans for the bonds should be worked out, and in the meantime to see if President Roosevelt could be prevailed upon to allow the CCC labor.

Members of Committee to be Named

Members of the committee for the formulation of allocation plans will be named at a later date by the county court.

New Phones Installed Today

The Malheur Home Telephone Company today 'cut over' all phones in Nyssa to the new schedule automatic telephones.

No Cranking

From now on it will not be necessary for phone customers to use a crank to call central. All that will be necessary is to raise the receiver off the hook.

Costs \$10,000

According to Mr. J. A. Davenport, local district manager, of the company, the cost of the new installation and the local telephone building will be in excess of \$10,000. Mr. Davenport said that the installation of the new phone system was unusual for such a small number of subscribers, but that the company had felt for a long time that Nyssa would soon be among the cities with a much larger list of subscribers and for that reason was only looking forward, with a view to better serving their patrons.

Bertsch Retires

Mr. G. E. Bertsch who for many years has been one of Nyssa's popular barbers has closed his shop and definitely retired from business, because of ill health. Mr. and Mrs. Bertsch have moved from the rear of their shop to one of their houses on Park Avenue and will make their home there in the future.
