Home Demonstration Meetings Scheduled

A series of meetings of special interest to homemakers in Malheur County has been announced by R. G. Larson, county agent.

The meetings are being held in a number of different communities. The projects to be studied in each community will be garment finishing. This project will be presented in all communities where meetings have been scheduled by Mrs. Louise Harwood, Home Demonstration Agent at Large from the Extension Service at Corvallis, Oregon.

The first of these meetings will start on Monday, October 11th. The series will be completed on Saturday, October 23rd. Two meetings a week apart will be held in each community, the same day of the week being used in each community where meetings are scheduled.

The schedule follows: Monday October 11th and Monday, October 18th the Big Bend, Kingman Kolony and Newell Heights communities at the home of Mrs. H. R. Hatch in Big Bend.

Tuesday, October 12 Jamieson and Willow Creek communities at the home of Mrs. H. R. McDaniel. The same communities will meet again at Mrs. McDaniel's home on October 19th.

Wednesday, October 13th, Vale and surrounding communities will meet at the home of Mrs. W. R. Johnson in Vale. The same communities will meet again with Mrs. Johnson on October 20th.

Thursday, October 14th the Oregon Slope and Weiser communities will meet at the home of Mrs. George H. White near the Pioneer school. The same communities will meet again on Thursday October 21st at the home of Mrs. Curtis Carico near the Park school.

Friday, October 15th the Oregon Trail, Owyhee, Nyssa and surrounding communities will meet at the home of Mrs. John Bowen in Nyssa. The meeting place for the second meeting on Friday, October 22nd will be decided at the first meeting. The last of the series on Saturday, October 16th will be held in the Ontario community. Full details and scheduling of this meeting has not been completed but will be announced in next week's paper.

These meetings are intended for any women in the county who wishes to attend. Meetings start at ten o'clock in the morning and will adjourn at about three-thirty in the afternoon. Each woman should bring with her some dish of food for a covered dish luncheon and a sewing kit. If possible, pieces of woolen, silk or cotton materials should be brought to the meeting. Every home maker in Malheur County is invited to attend any of the meetings scheduled.

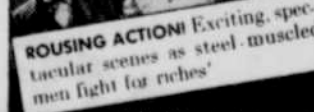
