America desperately needs and effective minority party. It should not have to rely on insurgents within the Democratic Party for the leadership and votes to oppose such projects as President Roosevelt's court plan.

This latter fact points directly to the real weakness of the minority. It needs to regain the confidence of the people, the friendship of the American people. The Republican party need not resort to "out-Santa Clausing Santa."

The party which seeks to win their confidence must come with those qualities. It must have something of the dynamic inspiring idealism and human sympathy which founded the Republican party.

The party which is to become effective in opposition must convince the people that its motives are right, that its opposition is sincerely devoted to preservation of essential constitutional liberties and a free economy.

An opposition party needs more than scum criticism of hasty legislation and faulty administration. It cannot supply the nation's need by harping on personality or exaggerating dangers of regimentation.

These requirements are onerous, and it is to be hoped that the party which is to become effective in opposition will be able to meet them.
