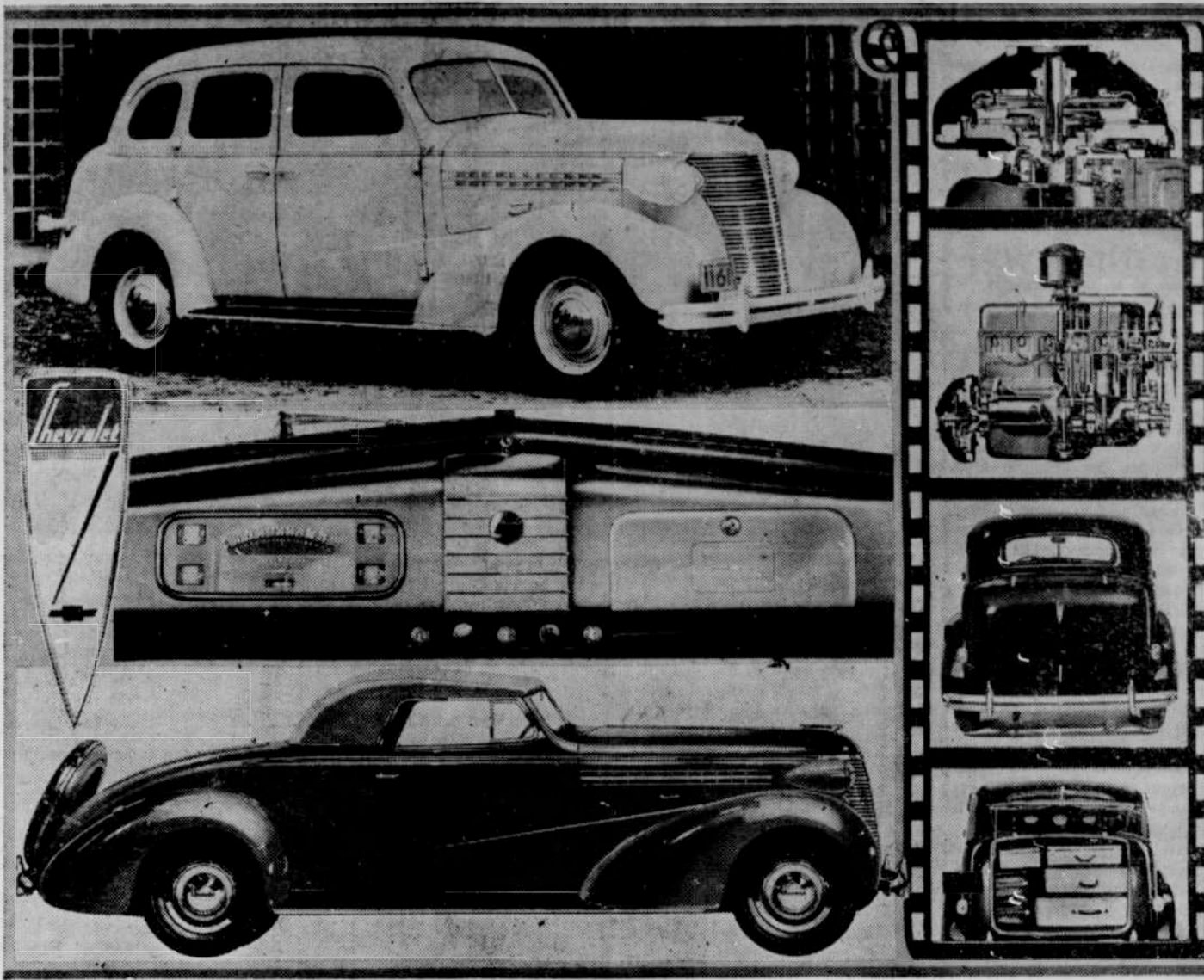
## BIRTHDAY DINNER
