Calvin Judy who died at the Oregon state prison Friday had spent 45 of his 89 years as an inmate of that institution. Judy was received at the prison in December, 1893, sentenced to serve a life sentence for killing a neighbor in the Loon Lake district of Douglas county over a line fine quarrel. He was paroled in 1909 by Governor Chamberlain but three years later was returned to the prison for violation of his parole. For many years he has been a privileged character at the prison enjoying privileges as a trustee and devoting his time to putting around at such odd jobs as his fancy dictated.

Urging citizens of Oregon to join in the observance of National Milk Week, November 14 to 20, Governor Martin points out that in this state alone there are 30,000 dairy farms representing a net worth of more than \$206,000,000.

A material increase in Oregon's tourist trade this year is noted by Secretary of State Snell from reports filed with his office. With two months still to go registration of foreign cars this year already exceed the record for 1936 by more than 4000. Snell attributes this increase to the advertising of Oregon's recreational assets as much as to the betterment of economic conditions throughout the nation.

A proposal on the part of attorney LeRoy Hershel McCarthy, condemned slayer of a Portland service state employee, to attack the constitutionality of the new statute prescribing lethal gas as the method to be employed in carrying out the death penalty, has raised an interesting point. Attorneys here point out that the new statute is merely an amendment to the old law providing for death by hanging and contend that if the lethal gas statute is invalidated the "gallows" provision will be automatically revived.

MyFavoriteRecipes

Frances Lee Barton says:

CHOCOLATE, the most universally popular flavor, today, is grand for dessert. Chocolate ice cream, for instance, is adaptable to countless summer uses (and winter too!) You can serve it plain or as a sundae, on angel food cake, or with cookies, as an ingredient of frosted chocolate or chocolate iceberg. Homemade chocolate ice cream is a hearty, nourishing food delicacy that merits a special place in every refrigerator.



Chocolate Ice Cream
3 squares unsweetened chocolate; 2 cups milk; 1 cup sugar; 4 tablespoons flour; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 2 eggs, slightly beaten; 4 cups light cream; 2 tablespoons vanilla.
Add chocolate to milk and heat in double boiler. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine sugar, flour, and salt; add gradually to chocolate mixture and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Then continue cooking 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add small amount of mixture to eggs, stirring vigorously; return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Cool. Add cream and vanilla. Freeze until stiff, using 8 parts ice to 1 part salt. Remove dasher and cover tightly; repack in 4 parts ice to 1 part salt. Makes 2 quarts ice cream.

U.S. BUREAU TO AID CITIES
Assistance in codifying ordinances will be extended to a number of cities in Oregon. It was announced by Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the League of Oregon Cities and director of the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon. A WPA grant of \$5,446.00 has been allotted the bureau for this work, Mr. Kehrl announced.

Cheese Biscuits
2 cups sifted cake flour; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 2 tablespoons butter or other shortening; 1 cup grated American cheese; 1/2 cup milk.
Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening and cheese. Add milk all at once and stir carefully until all flour is dampened. Then stir vigorously until mixture forms a soft dough and follows spoon around bowl. Turn out immediately on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds. Roll 1/4 inch thick and cut with 1 1/4-inch floured biscuit cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven (450° F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 2 dozen small biscuits.

The Unemployment Compensation commission which has occupied offices on the fifth floor of the state office building ever since its creation two years ago is moving this week to the old Salem high school building. Offices being vacated in the state building will be occupied by the State Police, Land Board and Banking department, all of which now occupy rented quarters in downtown office buildings.

State wards will fare well at Thanksgiving time, if purchase requisitions are any criterion of the good eats in store. The state hospital menu, for instance, will include 3000 pounds of chicken, 2000 pounds of mashed potatoes, 840 bunches of celery, 2000 pounds of cabbage, 200 gallons of sweet cider, 75 bushels of apples, 300 gallons of coffee, 5000 hot biscuits, 700 pumpkin pies and 75 coffee cakes. Other institutions are making similar plans for big dinners.

Two cases which may decide the fate of pin ball and slot machines in Oregon have been set for argument before the supreme court on November 17. Both cases are up on appeal from Polk county. Because of the state-wide importance of the issues involved it is expected that the court will expedite its decision and that an opinion will be handed down before the end of the year.

Oregon had three governors in as many days last week. When Governor Martin crossed the state line on his way to Tulsa, Oklahoma, F. M. Francisovich of Astoria, became governor by virtue of his position as president of the state senate. The next day Francisovich had to go to Olympia, Washington, on legal business whereupon the executive mantle automatically descended upon the shoulders of Harry Bolvin of Klamath Falls, speaker of the House of Representatives. Governor Martin is expected back at his desk tomorrow (Friday) after attending the annual reunion of his old division—the 91st—at Tulsa and spending a few days as the guest of the governors of Oklahoma and Texas.

Oregon will be feeding at least 60,000 men, women and children this winter according to Governor Martin. The number includes inmates of state institutions as well as those on relief and the needy aged who are eligible to pensions.

Only 15 state chartered savings and loan associations are now operating in Oregon compared to 22 five years ago, according to Corporation Commissioner James Hazlett. Assets of these domestic corporations decreased from \$19,645,141 in 1932 to \$14,656,660 in 1937, Hazlett's report shows.

Lester A. Wilcox, former superintendent of schools at Lebanon, has accepted appointment as a deputy in the office of Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction. Wilcox has been in educational work in Oregon a number of years, teaching at Springfield and Clatskanie before going to Lebanon in 1928.

TOURIST TRAVEL INCREASED TEN PER CENT

Oregon's automobile tourist travel increased ten per cent this year over the previous record year of 1936, registration records show. More than 150,000 motor vehicles will have crossed state lines into Oregon when the final tallies are made for the year, predicts Earl Snell, secretary of state.

With 17,228 nonresident automobile checked in September, the percentage of increase over the same month of the preceding year has continued. During the first nine months of this year 133,357 vehicles registered with the various stations throughout the state.
