In a city paper we read of a young man dying at one of the local hospitals from malnutrition.

While children starve and a wise government fights on a crop control bill and the farmer wonders how he will get through the winter and prays that he may get a loan in the spring for spring planting, potatoes and onions and corn and wheat and lettuce and apples and everything else have been dumped or fed to the hogs or lie packed in warehouses waiting for a rising market.

Why? Not because there is no market. Not because the people cannot or will not buy at a fair price. But because our marketing system needs revision and control and its face washed clean of the curse of gambling.
