CIRCUIT COURT ASKED FOR

Division of the 9th U.S. circuit court district and establishment in the Pacific Northwest of the 11th circuit court of appeals has been advocated and already carried to the U. S. attorney general in Washington D. C., by Carl C. Donaugh, U.S. attorney for Oregon, now a candidate for the democratic nomination for the senate. Donaugh's espousal of a northwest federal legal circuit has received wide endorsement. He bases his arguments on the northwest's population increases, it's remoteness from the center of the present 9th circuit (San Francisco), and the fact that the northwest is producing a growing volume of litigation peculiar to itself which should be passed on by its own court. He proposes that Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Alaska be included in the new circuit.
