Oppose Third Party Idea

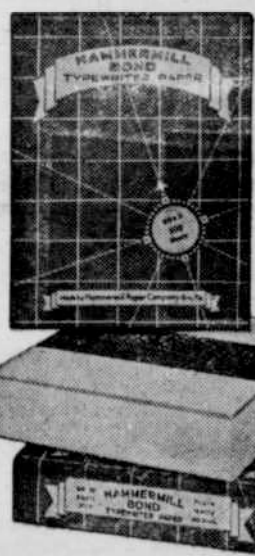
A new organization which is said to be opposed to the Townsend party idea was launched in Oregon this week with the filing of articles of incorporation. The organization is known as the Associated National Recovery clubs of Oregon. Incorporators include E. C. Ahlstrom and W. T. Brooner of Lakeview and F. M. Mortensen of Klamath Falls.

Oregon Road Maps Ready

Oregon's new 1938 road map is now ready for distribution. The new map contains much more information of value to tourists than its predecessors. Among this information is the location and acreage of game refuges and an extension of the border of the map to show high way connections in adjoining states.

Would Bar Union Fights

Harvesting, handling and marketing of agricultural products would be protected from interference by labor organizations under the terms of a revised initiative measure filed in Salem this week. The revised measure contains more teeth than did the original bill filed by the same sponsors two weeks ago. As did the first draft so also does the new one seek to define labor disputes, to regulate collective bargaining agencies and to forbid picketing and boycotts except in the case of a bona fide labor dispute.



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Oregon Dairy Industry

There are 30,000 dairy farmers in Oregon according to J. D. Mickie, dairy and food commissioner. Seventy-five processing plants handle dairy products valued at more than \$5,000,000 annually, Mickie said; 102 butter plants with an annual production of \$30,000,000; 50 cheese factories with annual payrolls aggregating \$375,000.

To Check Fishing Activities

Governor Martin has asked his State Planning Board to make a survey of fishing activities in the Columbia river to determine the extent of damage to the salmon industry by different kinds of gear. The survey was requested by the Oregon Seine and Pound Net Fishermen's association whose members are opposing the initiative measure sponsored by the Oregon Wild Life Council which would bar the use of fixed gear from the Columbia and its tributaries. A delegation of seiners and netters who called on the governor claimed that the sportsmen of the state have been misled into sponsoring the measure which is really inspired by the Columbia river gill-net fishermen in their effort to drive their competitors from the river.

Fourth Woman Senator

When Mrs. Lorah Spaulding of Salem was appointed by the Marion county court to succeed her husband, the late Charles K. Spaulding as a member of the state senate she became the fourth woman ever to be elevated to membership in that body. Mrs. Spaulding, however, will not have a chance to see active service in the legislature unless the law makers are convened in special session before next January since she has agreed not to become a candidate for re-election. In appointing the widow of a deceased member of the legislature to fill the vacant seat the Marion county court acted under a precedent established in 1931 when Mrs. Lotta Smith of Salem was appointed to succeed her husband, the late W. Carlton Smith, former state representative.

Investigations Saves Taxpayers Money

State Treasurer Holman's insistence upon a thorough investigation into the rental price to be paid for quarters for the State Re-Employment Bureau in Portland this week resulted in a saving of \$5400 in taxpayers' money. When Guy V. Lintner appeared before the Board of Control with a request for immediate approval of a lease on the new quarters at a rental of \$850 a month Holman objected to the "rush act" and demanded additional information. Further negotiations resulted in a reduction of the rental to \$700 a month a saving of \$150 a month or \$5400 for the three year period during which the lease is to run.

Little Buddy Rogers was at last reports still unable to attend school. The mastoid infection that he suffered with is not cleared up as it was hoped it would and his ear is still draining.

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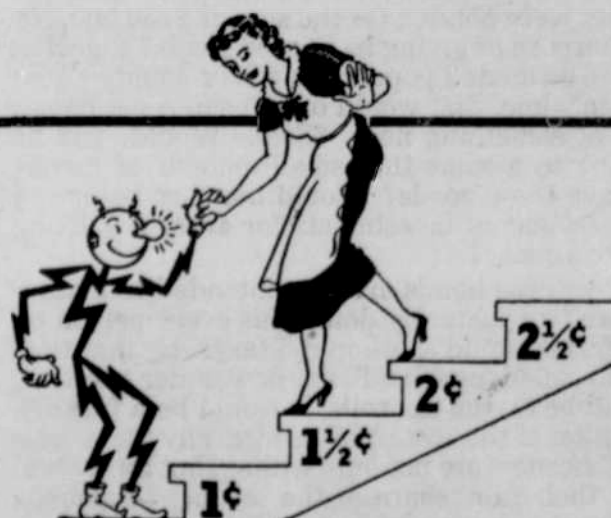

SHOULD MY BETTER PAIR OF TIRES BE CARRIED ON THE FRONT OR REAR WHEELS?

For considerations of safety, many drivers prefer to carry their better pair of tires on the front wheels, since they believe a front-tire blow-out is more apt to throw a car out of control than a rear-tire blowout. Because wear on the rear tires is greater, other drivers carry their better tires on the rear wheels so that all four tires will wear evenly and minimize the possibility of tire failure. Since expert opinion is divided, it is impossible to give a def-

inite answer to this question, but the best-tires-in-front theory seems to have found the most favor, because it is more consistent with principles of safety.

WHAT ARE SOME RULES ABOUT GIVING FIRST AID TO ACCIDENT VICTIMS?

Probably the most important rule is that no accident victim should be moved until the extent of his injuries has been determined, his broken bones have been properly splinted and a truck or ambulance is at hand to carry him to a hospital in a prone position. It is also important to stop profuse bleeding at once, and summon competent medical assistance. If there is any likelihood of serious injury, the victim should be kept prone and warmly covered until help arrives. Under no circumstances should the victim be encouraged to sit up or to walk around, nor should he be transported in a private passenger car, unless it is certain that his injuries are trivial. Every driver would do well to acquaint himself with the principles of first aid by studying a good hand book.
