"ACT as if you are not afraid, the death of fear is certain." That quotation is credited to Ralph Waldo Emerson. And in that phrase can be found a guide for our daily lives.

Fear lives in the dark places. Open the door of your mind, and it turns tail and runs for the nearest hole. Plug up that hole with the cement of logic, and you will have reached the point of putting fear out of your life.

Have you ever noticed that more you worry the heavier your burden seems? Doesn't that fact seem to suggest a remedy? Do not try to solve your problems all at one time. Try doing it a little at a time. And with each bit of solution, the rest of your problems will seem less troublesome.

Much has been said in the recent past about fear. It seems to be something like a snowball, rolled down a hill, the farther it goes the larger it gets. From a national standpoint as well as individually, we can overcome this fear, by acting with certainty, by facing the future with confidence.

If you are a farmer or home owner, put in that fence, new garage or whatever needs to be done around your home to make it more habitable.

As an individual, order that new suit, or for the ladies that new spring hat. It will do you a lot of good, at least from a psychological standpoint.

Or the merchant can do his share by stocking up with necessary stock to fill out his shelves.

Remember the man, or woman, who never makes a mistake, never does anything!

Don't sing the blues—it won't pull you out of the hole, but get rid of that sense of fear, and your troubles are over!

TO PROSPERITY—

LAST week's announcement that the County Judge and the Commissioners had named the committees to study the needs of roads in Malheur county, is the first step toward making this the most progressive and prosperous farming section in the country.

Before that committee, however, is one of the most vexatious problems, that one could conjure. The county road fund, through lowering of the road levy during the depression, is in such a state today that there is not enough money to operate and maintain the equipment!

It will be to this committee, that the farmers, as well as the urban dweller, will look for that solution. Of one thing we can be sure, it is going to cost us money—but money, that, in the truest sense of the word can be called an investment.

Last week, when this committee first met, a bond issue for the construction of the roads was freely discussed, and it was generally agreed that such a bond would be necessary. To some, the thought of bonds, is fearsome. But let us look at this proposition before us. Suppose that the county were bonded for the sum of \$150,000, for the purpose of giving us needed roads? Figuring on the estimated population of our county at the present time, that would only mean a per capita cost of something near \$8.40. Would you be willing to assume that small amount of money to have those roads? Would not that be one of the best sort of investments for every one living in the county?

Now these bonds are not intended to mature before two years. By doing this every person on our farms would share in the taxes. By that time the so called 'new land', not now under taxation, would be on the tax rolls. It would be a fair distribution of the cost. And incidentally these 'new land' farmers are not only willing, but anxious to bear their fair share of the county expenses. They are not asking for 'something for nothing'. And to bear out our contention on this point, may we call your attention to the recent road work done west and south of Nyssa, where those 'new land' farmers asked only for necessary equipment, doing the labor themselves.

THEY'LL HAVE NO ORGANIZATION

After a long period of united action, trouble has developed in the ranks of the Idaho Beet Growers' association, and a second organization is threatened.

Recently the Cassia county beet growers withdrew from the association, followed by growers in the Gooding, Lincoln and Jerome districts. Just why these sections are withdrawing from the parent organization, is not clear, and the rumor that it was started by disgruntled leaders who failed to receive what they believed proper recognition at the last election of the state body, may or may not have merit.

Organization of beet growers is certainly important to their best interests. If present conditions continue long, however, the beet growers of the state will find they have no organization.—Minidoka County News.

OUR POLLUTION PROBLEM

Stream pollution will be one of the important matters before the next session of Oregon's legislature. Sewage and other waste matter allowed to flow in many of the streams of the state has become a serious question in numerous instances, and no doubt something should be done in such cases. Baker was confronted with the pollution problem a few years ago and it was solved by the construction of a modern sewage disposal plant.

The controversy that will come over pollution when next presented to the legislature will probably come from a demand for legislation against muddy water in streams as a result of placer mining. Sportsmen is seems have the mistaken idea that mud in the streams spoils the fishing. They say fish cannot live in the muddy water.

The experiments recently conducted for the state department of geology and mineral industries, by Dr. L. E. Griffin, of Reed college, have proven the claim false. In fact the experiment has shown that young fish seem to thrive better in the muddy water than in clear water. The mortality rate among the fish in the clear water was about six times higher than in muddy water.

Those promoting pollution legislation should recognize this condition, use a little "common sense" in their demands and work out a plan that will not be detrimental to one of the important industries of the state.

The mining department is doing a good work in carrying out these experiments. It was the proper thing to do—get definite proof of the effect of the muddy water, where it comes from mining operations, upon the fish.—Eastern Oregon News.

THE REAL AMERICA

While complete figures gathered in the recent nation-wide unemployment census have not yet been furnished to the public, it will be of great interest to everyone around Wilder to learn one particular point in connection with it. That is that those figures which have so far been made available show that more than 80 per cent of the approximately registered as out of employment are residents of cities in excess of 5,000 population.

Small-town America, where about one-third of the nation's population lives in hamlets, villages and small towns, is and always has been the last section of the nation to feel the lack of jobs. Even the rural areas, because of idle farm labor, show a higher percentage of unemployment than the small towns. Approximately 18 per cent of unemployed men and women in the United States were without jobs as of last December 1st. But the percentage of idle in small-town America does not run nearly so high, in fact it probably does not exceed 8 per cent.

The small towns, the villages and the hamlets of this country are fortunate in more ways than one. Life may not have as many high spots in such places as is offered in the big and over-crowded cities, but neither does it have so many low ones. Men and women follow the even tenor of their ways in the small towns, the hamlets and the villages, and a far greater degree of peace and contentment, as well as comfort and well-being is the result.—Wilder Herald.

SALEM A CITY OF CHURCH-GOERS

Perhaps one reason why the Capital Press is such a profoundly moral and righteous publication is that each day the editor passes six churches in the short walk (six blocks) between his residence and the office. About eleven o'clock last Sunday there were 423 autos parked around these churches. If there were four people for each car there were 1692 people who came by auto to attend those six churches. It is probable that fully as many people came on foot as in autos, which makes it people attended those six churches. That's an average of 500 for each fair to assume that more than 3,000 church. There are more than 30

churches in Salem, and if the average held out in each case it would plainly indicate that about 15,000 people (half of the population of the city) attended church last Sunday. There's something haywire in these calculations. Evidently our deductions have led us to the point where, as we used to say in geometry recitations, the matter is reduced to an absurdity. Anyhow, if 15,000 people went to church there would be only 15,000 left to do anything else and according to reports which have reached this office there were about that many who went fishing—an yet there seemed no lack of people throughout the city. Without further attempts to figure it out, it is beyond question that a lot of people in Salem go to church every Sunday. With their co-operation the Capital Press feels justified in thumbing its nose at the devil and other politicians and declaring that day by day in everyday things are getting better and better.
