All Ready for Wildlife Week

Frederick F. Jordan (inset), director of National Wildlife Restoration Week, with headquarters at 400 Madison Avenue, New York City, announces that organization for Wildlife Week is practically completed in every state and county.

"Conservation and restoration of wildlife are matters of major interest to the people of Oregon," said Gov. Charles H. Martin in urging "wholehearted observance" of National Wildlife Restoration Week, beginning Sunday, March 20. "We have great areas in this state in which the development of wildlife resources is the highest possible form of economic utilization."

William Joy Smith, president of the Oregon Wildlife Federation, says, "National Wildlife Restoration Week will be the first time in the history of this country and state when the public has been called upon to consider the critical need for the conservation and restoration of wildlife. Oregon is prepared to do its full share in co-operating with the General Wildlife Federation's nation-wide program."

"Dinners and other fund-raising activities during the week will be held for the benefit of local organizations. All receipts will stay within the state."

"For support of the General Wildlife Federation, stamps will be sold, a penny apiece, sheets of 100 for \$1. These stamps represent sixteen animal subjects, drawn by Jay N. (Ding) Darling, famous cartoonist, former chief of the Bureau of Biological Survey and president of the General Wildlife Federation. Receipts from stamp sales will be divided between the General Federation and local groups that make the sales. Stamps may be obtained from local committees or direct from Fred Jordan at headquarters, 400 Madison Avenue, New York City."

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CHERRY FRUIT FLY CONTROLLED

SALEM—Almost complete control of the cherry fruit fly was obtained in the large Lamberta orchards 10 miles east of here by following the spray recommendations worked out by the Oregon experiment station, according to reports made by the growers to S. C. Jones, assistant entomologist at OSC. The Lamberta orchards have approximately 200 acres of cherries, probably the largest cherry orchard in the Willamette valley. Although three spray applications will ordinarily give control, five sprays were applied in these orchards to be on the safe side. The material used is a sweetened poison bait spray applied to the foliage to kill the adult flies just before the cherries ripen.

DOUGLAS SHEEPMEN CROSS FENCE

ROSEBURG — Many Douglas

county sheep growers are cross fencing their grazing lands to allow rotation grazing, which gives each section a rest during a part of the year and provides a means of re-seeding certain pastures and giving the plants a chance to become well established before being grazed, says County Agent J. Roland Parker. Most of the successful growers are now agreed that best results are obtained by burning over the ground before seeding. Grasses being used which give the greatest promise of providing a palatable and nutritious pasture in this county are highland bent, English rye, orchard grass, domestic rye, tall oats and meadow fescue.

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Sewer Contractors NOTICE
