If you were registered and did not vote at the last Primary or General Election; if you have changed your residence or if you desire to change your political affiliations, you must re-register.

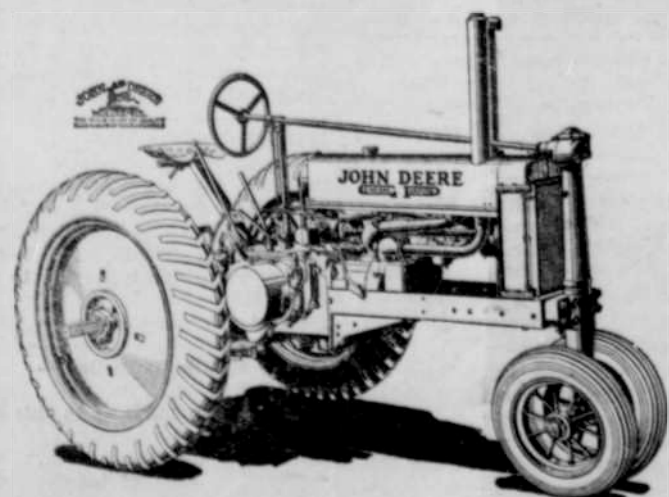
