CONFERENCE OF 4-H LEADERS
A three-day conference of Extension workers and 4-H local leaders was held this week at the experiment station in Union Oregon, with headquarters in the Union Hotel.

H. C. Seymour, state club leader, opened the assembly meeting on Wednesday and introduced to the group, D. E. Richards, superintendent of the experiment station, and H. G. Smith, assistant county agent of Union county. These two men extended a cordial greeting to all of those attending.

A L. G. Allen, assistant state leader in charge of Livestock also said a word of greeting.

The women's program was directed by Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state leader and in charge of the girls work in Oregon. She was assisted by Mrs. Louise Harwood, home demonstration agent, from Wasco county, and Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent from Umatilla county.

This program covered work in Styles and materials for cotton school dresses, canning, cooking pointers, selection of materials, seams and edge finishes for outer garments, tailored finishes for wool dresse and suits, technique of food preparation, scoring, judging and demonstrations, as well as a round table discussion each day.

The men's work was carried on at the experiment station, some of the things of interest on their program were livestock feeding and management practices, fairs and special contests, crops in the 4-H program, club tours and projects, field trips. The last two were led by LeRoy C. Wright, from Sherman county and C. C. Jenkins from Klamath.

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Governor Martin and Old Age Assistance

The improvement in the condition of the State's finances resulting from better control and management of expenditures, made possible the enactment of an old age assistance plan two years before the date required by the Federal Law and, later, the reduction of age from 70 years to 65 years.

As a result Oregon ranks twelfth among the States in the matter of payments for old age assistance, and tenth in the ratio of beneficiaries to population. This has been achieved without additional burdens being thrown upon the property of the taxpayers.

Through the efforts of the Governor, and the cooperation of the legislature, the Unemployment Compensation Commission was created to represent the State in the matter of cooperation with federal authorities in the administration of the several Social Security Acts. Through these Federal and State Acts the worker will find security in years to come.
