The Anti's Are Loose Again

SALEM, Ore.—Entrance of Henry Hess, LaGrande attorney, into the political arena at the eleventh hour as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, was the outstanding development in a hectic day in which 145 candidates thronged the state department in a last minute rush to get their names on the primary ballot.

Opinion as to the political strength of Hess in the forthcoming election differ widely depending upon the personal sympathies of the particular prognosticator. Some there are who insist that he will prove a formidable opponent to Governor Martin with definite prospects of success in his desire to carry the party's banner in the fall campaign. Others just as emphatically discount any suggestion that Hess presents any menace to the candidacy of Governor Martin. Be that as it may one fact remains indisputable; Hess will be able to consolidate the anti-Martin forces throughout the state as neither Dr. J. F. Hosch or Dr. Ralph M. Erwin could hope to do.

The entry of Hess into the Democratic gubernatorial contest came as the climax of a series of conferences between anti-Martin leaders beginning in Portland on Sunday morning and ending in Salem just in time to permit Hess to get in under the five o'clock deadline with his filing. Information circulating from these conferences has it that most of the efforts of the conferees was devoted to persuading Hosch and Erwin to withdraw in favor of Howard Latourette of Portland, Democratic national committeeman, whose plans to enter the contest were interrupted when Hosch filed allegedly in violation of an agreement to the contrary which he is said to have entered into. It was only when these negotiations failed through the refusal of either Erwin or Hosch to give way to Latourette that the conference turned to Hess as the one man whom the contending factions could center in their determination to "best Martin."

The last minute entry of R. J. Hendicks of Salem and Henry Hansen of Portland into the Republican gubernatorial campaign are not expected to have any considerable bearing on the outcome of that contest with Sam Brown, the Gervais farmer, and Charles A. Sprague,

Salem newspaper man, remaining heavy favorites in the guessing so far.

Ladies Want Their Share Too

A total of 363 men and women are offering their services to the state in one or another of the 108 different public offices to which candidates are to be elected in Oregon this year. Of this number 169 are Republicans, 163 are Democrats and 31 are non-partisan candidates for judicial positions on the circuit or supreme bench. One hundred and forty-five candidates, 40 percent of the total number, filed their declarations on the last day.

Twenty-one women are candidates for state offices this year. Four of these are Republicans and 17 are Democratic candidates. Four women—two Republicans and two Democrats—aspire to seats in the state senate. Sixteen women—two Republicans and 14 Democrats—have filed for house seats. Mrs. Emily F. Edson of Portland, Democratic national committeewoman, is a candidate for secretary of state.

On the legislative ticket the Republicans have vacancies in the 23rd senatorial district and in the 2nd, 16th, 27th and 32nd representative districts. The Democrats failed to fill out their ticket in the 15th senatorial district, an 8th, 11th, 15th, 19th, 21st, 23rd, 25th and 31st representative districts.

The Taxpayer Pays For It

A report by the State Relief committee to Governor Martin shows that a total of \$44,322.113 were spent in Oregon for relief purposes between August 1, 1932, and December 31, 1937. Of this amount the federal government contributed \$23,700,289 or more than 50 percent, through its various relief administrations. The state's share of this relief burden amounted to \$7,776,397 and the several counties put up a total of \$7,514,101. Multnomah county with one-third the state's total population received \$34,465,987 or more than one-half the total relief funds.

Must Warning Flares be Carried By Trucks at all Times?

These warning flares or electric signals are required to be displayed only at night, so they must be carried from a half hour after sunset to a half hour before sunrise. Most truck operators keep their vehicles equipped with flares at all times as a matter of course, although trucks which are operated only during the daytime need not carry them. Red flags are required in the latter case.

There must be at least three of the flares, so that in case the truck is disabled on the highway at night flares can be placed 100 to 300 feet in front of and behind the truck, with a flare beside it, to warn other

drivers of its exact location. Vehicles subject to rules of the public utilities commissioner or the interstate commerce commission, or operated entirely within three miles of the limits of an incorporated city, are not subject to these provisions.

How Effective Must my Emergency Brake Be?

If the emergency brake system is entirely separate from the service brake system, it need not necessarily measure up to the standard of performance for stopping the car required of the service brake. The emergency brake must, however, be strong enough to stop and to hold the vehicle at any time in case the service brake fails.

Where the two brake systems are interconnected, they must be so constructed that failure of one part of the operating mechanism will not leave the vehicle without brakes on at least two wheels.

TOUGH ON OREGON DOPE PEDDLERS

These are tough times for the dealer in marijuana in Oregon. Active enforcement of the federal marijuana act coupled with unceasing prosecution by the office of U. S. District Attorney Carl C. Donagh has not only boosted the price of the "hashish" cigarettes to 50 cents apiece but has made it practically impossible to obtain the drug at all. Scores of arrests by the bureau of narcotic agents cooperating with state and city police and deputy sheriffs has practically ended the source of supply of this drug in Oregon, Donagh said. Of the first 14 arrested on charges of marijuana traffic, Donagh or his deputy attorneys obtained convictions against 13. Sentences aggregated 30 years. The 14th man was also convicted but is being investigated by the probation officer. Although Donagh is now on leave of absence from the U. S. attorney's office while campaigning for the Democratic senatorial nomination, his office is still vigorously prosecuting what marijuana offenders are arrested.
