DON'T LET 'GEORGE DO IT'

That caption is for those who may not yet be registered for the primaries this coming May. If you do let 'George do it' you may find yourself grumbling about the governmental representation that you have to live under. If you do not register on or before April 19, which is Tuesday of next week, you will not be eligible to vote.

A deputy registrar is located in Nyssa, and any one in the county who can qualify as to residence may register at his office. There is no charge for this service, and relieves the voter of the necessity of going to the county seat to register.

In order that there will be no doubt as to the eligibility of residents of our community the following is taken from Article Two, Section Two of the Oregon Election Laws "In all elections, not otherwise provided for by this constitution, every citizen of the United States, of the age of 21 years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and who shall be duly registered prior to such election in the manner provided by law, shall be entitled to vote, * * * * *"

Two Minute Sermons

WHEN STATESMEN PRAYED FOR GUIDANCE

Not many years ago it was the custom to hold a family prayer circle and men in high places petitioned God for His divine favor, but of late we seem to be getting away from this ennobling Christian principle. Prayer is a source of power; all truly great men have been prayerful men. Nothing of lasting value has been accomplished, except through prayer. If prayer were a special gift only to be exercised by our priest or bishop, how eager we would be for that privilege, but it was meant that all should pray.

A prayerful man is seldom unethical in his relationships with his fellow men. No man can habitually pray with a sincere heart and at the same time be guilty of unchristianlike conduct. A man who has the habit of prayer is honest and charitable. He knows how fallible is the reasoning of man alone. If one will acquire this habit and throughout his life be religious in its practice, he will not go far wrong—he cannot if he be an individual with a conscience. And yet the habit is difficult to acquire. So many times we would rather jump into bed without first kneeling to pray, unless, perhaps, there is serious illness in our family or for some other reason we need the assistance of a Power beyond our own. Then we are constrained to pray with all the fervor of our souls. Why not travel the avenue of prayer continually, then in an hour of darkness we will know the

Not until a prayer was offered did one of the most significant assemblies of all time hit upon a common purpose, and at that time Benjamin Franklin on the last day of the fifth week arose, and addressing George Washington and the wise men assembled in the Constitutional Convention, said:

Mr. President, the small progress we have made after four or five weeks' close attention and continual reasoning with each other, our different sentiments on almost every question, is, methinks, a melancholy proof of the imperfection of human understanding. We indeed seem to feel our own want of political wisdom, since we have been running all about in search of it. We have gone back to ancient history for models of government and examined the different forms of those republics which having been originally formed with the seeds of their own dissolutions, now no longer exist and we have viewed modern states all around Europe, but find none of their constitutions suitable in our groping, as it were, in the dark to circumstances.

In this situation of this assembly, find political truth, and scarce able to distinguish it when presented to us, how has it happened, sir, that we have not hitherto once thought of humbly applying to the Father of Light to illuminate our understandings?

I have lived, sir, a long time; and the longer I live the more convincing proofs I see of this truth, the God governs in the affairs of men. And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? We have been assured, sir, in the Sacred Writings, that "except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it." I firmly believe this, and I also believe that without His concurring

aid we shall succeed in this political building no better than the builders of Babel; we shall be divided by our little partial, local interests, our projects will be confounded, and we ourselves shall become a reproach and a byword down to future ages. And, what is worse, mankind may hereafter, from this unfortunate instance, despair of establishing government by human wisdom and way to God.

I therefore beg leave to move: That hereafter prayers, imploring the assistance of Heaven and its blessing on our deliberations, be held in this assembly every morning before we proceed to business, and that one or more of the clergy of this city be requested to officiate in that service.

And from then on they began to make progress in the framing of our Constitution.

THE TRIPLE C. AS A CHARACTER BUILDER

The Civilian Conservation Corps will celebrate its fifth birthday on April 5. The triple C camps in all parts of the country are holding "open house" and are extending a cordial welcome to all who visit the camp.

If you haven't already visited a conservation camp, you should make it a special point to do so. Visitors will have the opportunity to see how the boys live, how they work, study and play.

While everyone has seen CCC boys, few realize the activity that exists in these camps, the tremendous amount of work that has been accomplished by them, and the cheerful and optimism with which they start and steadily complete from the smallest job to large construction and development.

The CCC's have been aptly called an "All-American" institution. It is a training ground for youth, giving them the opportunity never before offered the youth of any country. The boys are trained to do all manner of work, giving them opportunity to find the work which best suits them. They are trained in leadership, citizenship, morals, cleanliness, and in the respect for public and private property.

CCC enrollees themselves develop in health and weight. To those associated with the Triple C's, it is a source of constant satisfaction to see young men develop. Their chests expand, eyes brighten, skin takes on a healthy bronze color, and above all, the lads find out that they can really do big things.

Man enrollees who have left camps have written to their foreman and camp superintendents telling of their success in obtaining work. Many because of their training hold responsible positions. Who knows what the effect of this training will be? Its camps are stretched from coast to coast with thousands of lads from the eastern states here in the west for the first time in the lives. All have learned to love our western country. Many will never leave.

CONSERVATION

Recent attempts to organize county sportsmen in a wild life conservation league seem to have met with enough opposition to discourage the idea entirely. It is just possible that the opposition was purely imaginary, based on past controversies, but it is true that some feeling does

exist among miners and lumbermen that any move toward conservation is a move opposed to their interests.

This is not necessarily true. Conservation is a big problem being faced by the whole nation. Many places in the east have found that the time for conservation has passed and, in effect, reconstruction will be necessary first. It is still not too late in Josephine county.

Mining and lumbering are our two biggest industries and the loss of either of them would be a severe blow to the county, but a conservation program is also important to the future of the county as well as to the lumbermen and miners. Conservation needs representation here in an active organization and the county needs a reasonable attitude on the part of both sides for a safe future.—Grants Pass Bulletin
