"Noblesse Oblige," a pretty phrase isn't it? But so much more than that, when one stops to consider. Even in the strictest literal sense—"Nobility obliges"—these two words have a deep meaning, but in its connotation, the expression conveys a whole concept on philosophy of conduct. The French words were first used in relation to the obligations of nobility because they were the ruling class, with the duties and responsibilities which have rested on rulers since the beginning of time. "Rank imposes obligations." Isn't this every bit as true and as live today as when the first person remarked "noblesse oblige?" Rank of any sort in the community, in the home, or in the school, does impose a very definite obligation. And rank doesn't mean a position of leadership alone. Rank of character and trust is equally obligated by itself to certain high standards. Everyone within himself well as in relations with others, should be impelled by that intangible force which says to him "Do the right and the noble thing" not for the reward or for the fear of consequences in doing otherwise, but just because it is expected of one of noble character. Can you think of a higher tribute, than to have said of your action in any situation, "Noblesse Oblige?"

Value of Eggs as Food
Eggs are one of the best sources of fat, proteins, minerals and vitamins. The egg yolk is high in fats, containing six fatty acids and the white contains four different types of protein. Several vitamins are found in eggs. It is well supplied with vitamin A, is a good source of vitamin D, and also contains the anti-sterility vitamin E as well as vitamin G.

Kangaroo Hunting Great Sport
Kangaroo hunting is such a sport that especially swift dogs, called kangaroo hounds, are bred to run the animals down. When pursued the kangaroo will run into shallow water, and when the dogs attack him he will grab them, one after the other, and hold them under water with his powerful legs and tail until they drown.

Drums Long in Use
In some form or other the drum was known to the earliest civilizations and to almost every nation. Excavations at Thebes disclosed an ancient Egyptian drum while early sculptures show the drum's use for martial purposes.

Longest Aqueduct in World
The Los Angeles aqueduct has a total length, including the diverting canal and reservoirs, of 233 miles. This is the longest aqueduct in the world. It brings water from the Owens river in the heart of the Sierra Nevada mountains and provides water power in its fall to the city level. Work was begun on this aqueduct in 1908 and the project was completed in 1913. The cost of the aqueduct and its accessories was \$24,600,000.

Early Inventor of Steamboat
John Fitch is considered one of the earliest inventors of the steamboat, preceding Fulton by about 20 years. On August 27, 1787, his steamboat, propelled by 12 wooden paddles, plied up and down the Delaware river at a speed of three miles an hour.

Solved Aerial Navigation
Readers of the Norfolk Virginian-Pilot were astounded on the morning of December 13, 1903, when they picked up their paper and read: "The problem of aerial navigation without the use of a balloon has been solved at last. Over the sand hills of the North Carolina coast yesterday, near Kitty Hawk, two Ohio men (Orville and Wilbur Wright) proved that they could soar through the air in a flying machine of their own construction, with the power to steer and speed it at will. This, too, in the face of a wind blowing at the registered velocity of 21 miles an hour."

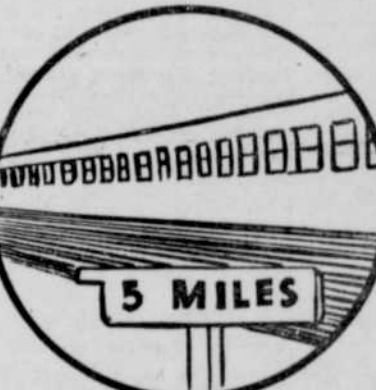

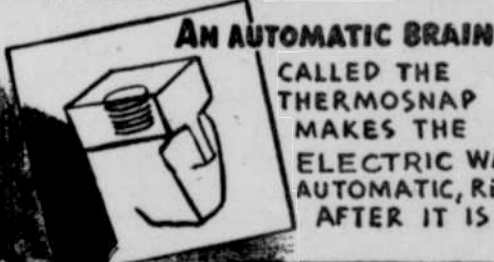

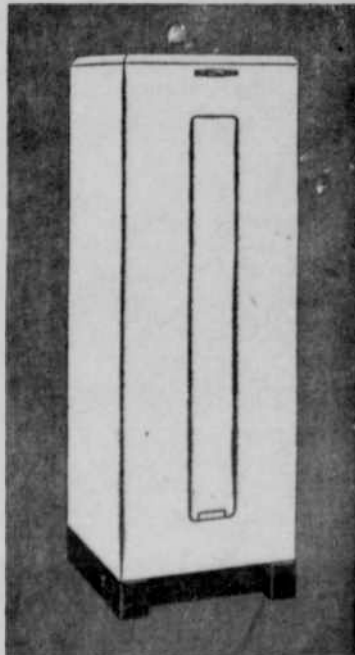
