Animals and Darkness
No animal can see if it is perfectly dark, for the eye is so constructed that light rays from an object must be reflected into the eye before it can be seen and with the total absence of light, there can be no light rays. There are many animals, however, like the domestic cat, that have the power of expanding the pupil of the eye very wide so as to admit more easily any light rays that may be present. Thus it is possible for them to see better in faint light or dusk than animals lacking the power to enlarge the pupil of the eye.

Lumber Measure
In the lumber trade the unit of measurement is the "board-foot," which equals 1 square foot, 1 inch thick. To find the board-feet in a standard board multiply the length, in feet, by the width, in inches, and divide the result by 12. To get the board-feet in planks or square timbers, multiply the length in feet by the width and then the thickness in inches and divide by 12.
