**WORK CAMPS RECOMMENDED**  
Governor Martin's special committee on probation, parole and sentencing of prisoners, meeting here this week, recommended that work camps be established for the employment of trustees and parolees in forestry, conservation and other public works projects. Men employed in these camps would be paid a small compensation "to enable them to make a start when released into society."

**MAKING MONEY GO FARTHER**  
Only one-third of the checks being written by the Unemployment Compensation Commission are for the maximum amount of \$15 a week. Forty per cent of the compensation checks going out to unemployed workers are for sums under \$12 a week.

**LINN COUNTY TO VOTE ON UTILITY DISTRICT**  
Residents of Linn county who go to the polls at the primary election will also have an opportunity to vote on the question of organizing a peoples' utility district. The Hydro-electric commission has called a utility district election for May 20. At a previous election in November, 1936, the proposal was rejected.

**MORE LAWYERS**  
Ninety-seven law school graduates have signed up for the bar examination to be held in Salem July 12, according to Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the supreme court.

**WANT TO KEEP THEIR FEET IN THE TROUGH**  
Sixty-seven of the 76 members of the last legislature whose terms are expiring are candidates in the primary campaign now being waged. Forty-two of the 60 members of the House of Representatives are seeking re-election. Of these 16 are Republicans and 26 Democrats. Five house members—two Republicans and three Democrats—seek promotion to the state senate. Two former represent-

atives—Walter Norblad of Astoria and Jack Wagner, Portland Democrat, are candidates for congress. Two house Democrats—Clarence F. Lyde of Eugene and Paul E. Roth of Portland—would like to be state labor commissioner. One house member—O. Henry Olen of St. Helens—is out after the Democratic nomination for Governor.

Eight Republican and five Democratic members of the state senate are candidates for re-election. One senator—Dellmore Lessard, Portland Democrat—is a candidate for the Multnomah county district attorneyship. Senator U. S. Balentine whose term does not expire until 1941, is a candidate for congress from the second district.

**CAPITAL BUILDING HEATING**  
Apparently reversing a previous oral opinion Attorney General Van Winkle this week advised the Capitol Reconstruction Commission that it is clothed with ample authority to finance construction of a new heating plant on any site owned by the state. The attorney general had previously indicated that expenditure of funds under control of this commission must be confined to the enlarged capitol site.

In the same opinion the attorney general advised the Board of Control that an act passed by the 1935 legislature authorized the purchase of a site on which to build a heating plant and that the present situation constituted an emergency under which the State Emergency Board might provide the money necessary to finance the purchase.

Negotiations are already under way with the Public Works Administration in an effort to transfer a portion of the federal grant from the new library building to the proposed heating plant. If the necessary permission is forthcoming the commission is expected to rush plans for construction of the new plant which will serve not only the

new capitol and library building but the supreme court building, office building and agricultural building.

**NO CHANCE TO "LISTEN IN" ON NEIGHBORS**  
Installation of a central switchboard through which all telephone calls to and from state departments housed in the capitol group will be cleared, is practically completed. The installation is being made by the telephone company without cost to the state. The board will have a capacity of 300 telephones and will be connected with the telephone exchange by 29 trunk lines. No considerable saving in telephone costs is anticipated by reason of the centralized exchange which is designed primarily to expedite handling of telephone calls to and from state departments.

**EXPECTS INFLUX OF TOURISTS**  
Harold B. Say, head of the highway department's travel bureau predicts that tourists will spend more than \$40,000,000 in Oregon this year. More than 18,000 inquiries have already been received by the department from prospective visitors in every state in the union and 30 foreign countries, Say declared.

**OPPOSES SALE OF TIDELANDS**  
The State Land Board has gone on record as opposed to further sales of tidelands along Oregon streams or ocean beaches. The board adopted this policy after rejecting two bids for the purchase of 44 acres of tidelands on Quinn's island in the Columbia river, said to be valuable for fishing purposes. The board will lease the land instead, charging poundage fees which will go to enrich the common school fund.
