HEALTH PROTECTION

None of us appreciate our good health until some sort of illness overtakes us.

All of us can insure ourselves of lessening the dangers of illness by taking advantage of preventatives when we have the first suspicion that we 'are not feeling up to snuff.'

Which leads us to the tuberculin tests that are offered through the co-operation of the Malheur county Healthy Association, the local doctors and our public health nurse, Mrs. Farris.

Tuberculosis is not a disease to be dreaded that it once was. With proper examination at the first indication of colds that 'hang on,' and later develop into chronic coughing. The 'test' is simple, takes only a few minutes, and does not give a 'reaction' that makes one take to his bed. If you happen to be one of the persons that do react to the test, and if proper medical care is begun at once, you will have nothing to fear. In mild cases cures can be affected within a year, but in the event that curative measures are put off, the cure will take much more time.

Every adult owes it to his or her children, as well as to the community at large, to have one of the tests—it takes but a short time—is painless and will insure you of a longer, useful life.

CLEAN UP—FOR OUR HEALTH'S SAKE

Mayor Graham, at the last session of the city council, said that the city health board would, in a short while make an official tour of the city, making notes of the general sanitary conditions, as well as the esthetical conditions.

No more timely tour could be made. We are a growing city, perhaps of a necessity sanitary conditions are not what they should be. But if our health board will start to function, when time from their private business allows, Nyssa should and could be made a lot more attractive to the eyes of those passing through, or are here for a short visit.

Sanitary conditions, of course, are the most important. But if our citizens will try to co-operate with the health board, these conditions will be greatly improved.

As to the general 'cleaning-up,' of our alley's and vacant lots, everyone of us should take it upon ourselves, as a 'committee of one' to see that all garbage is cleaned up, AND MOVE TO THE CITY DUMP, that weeds are burned off, tin cans and other unsightly trash removed.

Well could we follow the example set by our smaller neighbor, Vale, in the excellent clean-up campaign recently put on by her citizens. Every section of the town of Vale was gone over, stores were closed for a period of two hours, each afternoon, for a few days, with all business men, and their help, taking an active part in the 'clean-up' campaign.

Some such method could, no doubt, be worked in Nyssa. It will take some organization and fore-thought, if the job is done properly, arrangements for trucks, extra labor, proper

Central Oregon Fishing Conditions

The weather is cold and raw with occasional flurries of snow at the higher elevations. In consequence fishing has been exceedingly poor since Saturday, which was the last warm day. Fishing prospects for the present week end depend entirely on the weather man. Should there be every reason to believe that good results may be obtained along the Deschutes and Molokai rivers, at Suttle lake and at the two Twins. But if the weather remains cold as it is today, there will be little fishing except for the hearty individual who is willing to put on all the clothes he owns and sit out and fish with bait, and that does not sound too promising. We, therefore are not going to trouble with listing the various fishing waters in detail because we would have the same thing to say about each.

Road Conditions

The forest service snow plows are now at work opening the road into East and Pauline lakes. A gate has been erected by the forest service at the boundary which will be kept closed and locked until the road dries up to a sufficient extent to permit cars to traverse it without getting stuck, so our guess of May 15 as the actual opening of the road into these lakes still holds.

The Willamette highway from U. S. 97 to Crescent lake junction, which was too soft for travel for sometime past is now dried out so that it is in excellent condition and the road from the Willamette highway into the town of Crescent lake has just been graded and is in first class condition for travel but the road is not yet open from the town to the lake.

Last Friday two cars broke through the snow from Crescent lake junction into the lower end of Odell lake by using chains and reported excellent fishing at that time. However, the cold weather has undoubtedly changed that.

John Day highway (U. S. 28)—Due to the recent rains, a short section of the road under construction between John Day and Prairie City has been virtually impassable. It should be satisfactory for travel

coming from the east, state 54 will be found in excellent condition.

U. S. 97—Most of the rough spots on this road have been patched up and the speed of travel is now almost up to normal. There is a reasonable possibility that there may be some wild flower enthusiasts among the readers of this bulletin and if so, we wish to call their attention to the gorgeous display of wild flowers now in evidence along U. S. 97. There are great fields of sauerbreen, a variety of penstemon, assortment of daisies, beat mat, wild currant, moss roses and many others.

An Interesting and Unusual Trip

Central Oregon has a great variety of interesting and unusual spots. There are so many beauty spots that many unique features go almost unnoticed. The object of this paragraph is to call attention to what is locally known as the "Hole in the Ground". The Hole in the Ground is located about two miles east of U. S. 31, in excess of one-half mile in diameter and 490 feet deep. Geologists are of two schools—one school claims it to be the bed of a meteor; the other insists that it is a blow out. At first glance, the meteor theory would appear to have the better of the argument because an examination of the crater would indicate that a gigantic body, traveling from the southwest, had struck the earth's surface—while in the case of a blow out, the walls should be more regular. Near this Hole in the Ground is another natural phenomena, known as Fort Rock. This is the remains of an ancient-volcanic cone, the loose cinder portion having been washed away by the old lake which covered the country extending from the Paulina mountains south into northern California and leaving standing only the present fort shaped arrangement of lava rock, rising many hundred feet above the surrounding plain formed by the loose material washed away from the cone. STRICTER PATROL OF HIGHWAYS IS BEGUN

Curbing of reckless driving, curbing of speed and enforcement of the dimming law will be three of the traffic laws that will be stressed at night by the increased force of state patrolmen that started May 1, announced J. L. Balderston, Commissioner of the department of law enforcement in making a number of changes in the state force personnel. He said that other changes will probably be made in the near future.

In pointing to the necessity of a stricter patrol of the highways in the late afternoon and early evening, the hours of peak travel, the commissioner said:

"Death never rests and is on the job 24 hours a day, seven days a week, but is most active between seven and eight o'clock in the evening. The national statistics show that in the total of 40,300 killed last year, 3,700 persons were killed and 94,000 were injured during the hour from seven to eight p. m. On January 19 at 7 o'clock in the evening, three Indians were killed in a crossing accident at Fort Hall, and two months later to the day and hour, four persons were killed five miles north of the scene of the Fort Hall crash, and the week following at 7:15 p. m. four persons were killed five miles south of Idaho Falls. Almost all of our fatalities since the first of the year, have occurred between 4 p. m. and 2 a. m." —Camas County (Idaho) Courier.
