NOTICE TO WATER USERS

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Nyssa, in special session passed Ordinance number 246 entitled "an Ordinance creating the office of Superintendent of Water Works and Sewers, providing for the manner of filling said office, fixing the salary of the incumbent and defining his duties; regulating the use of the City Water system and Sewer, the manner of making Connections, providing a Fee for same, fixing the Rates and Tolls for the use of water furnished by the City, and providing a method of Collecting and declaring an Emergency.

"Section 9. All such tolls and charges shall be due and payable in advance and unless paid within ten days same shall become delinquent. It shall be the duty of the Water Superintendent to notify each water user who is delinquent, and give such water user an opportunity to pay such delinquency, but if the amount of the delinquency be not paid within five days of the time of delinquency the Superintendent shall forthwith shut off the water from such consumer and shall keep the same shut off until all such charges against such consumer are paid, together with the fee of One Dollar for turning on said water."
