## Poppy Day Facts---

### What is Poppy Day?

Poppy Day is a day observed throughout the United States by wearing memorial poppies in honor of the World War dead. It will be observed this year on May 28th, the Saturday before Memorial Day.

### What is the Memorial Poppy?

The memorial poppy is a replica of the poppies which grew on the battle fields of France and Belgium during the World War.

### Why was the poppy chosen as the Memorial Flower?

The poppy was chosen as the memorial flower for the World War dead because it grew where they fell, the one touch of beauty in the desolate battle areas.

### Who makes the Memorial Poppy?

Memorial poppies are made by disabled World War veterans working in government hospitals and in convalescent work rooms maintained by the American Legion Auxiliary.

### Who distributes the Memorial Poppy?

Women of the American Legion Auxiliary, working as unpaid volunteers, distribute the poppies throughout the United States.

### What is done with the money contributed for the poppies?

Every penny is used to support the work of the American Legion and Auxiliary for the welfare of the disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

### Who wears the Memorial Poppy?

Every American who wishes to honor the war dead and aid the war's living victims.

## Central Oregon Fishing Conditions

Up until last Monday fishing con-  
ditions have been generally improv-  
ing but the weather turned cold  
raw Monday and fishing generally,  
and fly fishing in particular, has  
not been so good. Some of the high  
lakes have been too rough to get a  
boat on.

**Deschutes River Below Bend—**  
The river below the mouth of Crook-  
ed river has been clearing and some  
good catches have been made on  
flies all the way from Bend to  
North Junction, even during the re-  
cent cold weather. Better results  
have been obtained using salmon  
flies for bait.

**Deschutes River Above Bend—**  
Cold weather has slowed the fish  
down until very little results have  
been obtained the past three days  
on either bait or fly.

**Metolius River—**This stream has  
been less effected by the weather  
than most. Fly fishing has been not  
quite as good the past three days as  
on the week end but some nice  
catches have been made.

**Crooked River—**Still quite muddy  
but some good catches are being  
made on bait by fishing where the  
clear water shades into the muddy.  
Salmon flies and eggs are used.

**Suttle Lake—**Still catching small  
rainbows and bluebacks on single  
eggs.

**Paulina Lake—**Road is now open  
and in good condition. Ice is all off  
the lake. The fish are still deep and  
results are obtained only on bait.  
Fish have been running from one to  
four pounds, the rainbow running  
somewhat larger than the brook.

**East Lake—**Lake is now free of  
ice but road is still impassable be-  
tween Paulina and East. The resort  
is open for business and the brook  
are taking bait very satisfactorily.  
We are afraid the present cold weath-  
er will delay the road opening un-  
til about the 29th.

**South Twin Lake—**Small silvers  
and brooks being taken on eggs with  
an occasional large brook.

**North Twin Lake—**The few large  
brooks in the lake have apparently  
taken a vacation. No results for sev-  
eral days.

**Crescent Lake—**Road open to the  
lake. Some fine large rainbows and  
some fair brook were taken by troll-  
ing plugs last week end.

**Odell Lake—**Road open to Odell  
lodge at east end of lake. Summit  
lodge is accessible only by rail or by  
boat from the east end. Some very  
large dollys and rainbows have been  
taken on a troll. Last week end, Mrs.  
Finley of Odell lodge caught a thir-  
ten and three-quarter pound rain-  
bow on a plug. That's a real fish in  
anybody's country.

**Big Lava Lake—**It is now possible  
to drive to within a mile of Big  
Lava. Some nice brooks and an oc-  
casional rainbow were taken there  
last week end, casting from shore.

**Roads**  
The North Sanitiam highway is  
now open and in good condition. No  
start has been made toward open-  
ing McKenzie Pass yet.

The Amish denomination takes its  
name from Jacob Amen, a Mennon-  
ite preacher who resided in the can-

large hook and eye fastener.

## Two Minute Sermons

"NO ESTRANGEMENT"

(Written for The Christian Science  
Monitor)

How few there are who can say  
that they have never known the  
meaning of the word "estrangement!"  
As men and women go on  
in life and their contacts with their  
fellow men become more numerous,  
it seems sometimes that the oppor-  
tunity for misunderstandings and  
for estrangements becomes greater.  
When a man, such as the late Can-  
on Sheppard, is known for his  
number and the variety of his  
friends, he is considered almost a  
phenomenon. Although many of us  
can name some one friend of whom  
it is possible to say, "He never made  
an enemy," such people seem few  
and far between.

W may assume, however, that it  
is difficult for any great reformer  
go through life without having an  
enemy, when we recall that Christ  
Jesus, the best man who ever lived,  
had many implacable enemies. But  
we may also affirm that Jesus never  
permitted himself to become es-  
tranged from his followers. When  
his friends failed him, as they did  
time and again, he lovingly strove  
to bring them back to the fold. He  
said (John 10:28), "neither shall  
any man pluck them out of my  
hand." Later he said (John 17:12),  
in his wonderful prayer to the Fa-  
ther he so faithfully served, "Those  
that thou gavest me I have kept,  
none of them is lost, but the son of  
perdition." Yet even Judas, "the son  
of perdition," after his grievous sin,  
repented and cried in agony (Mat-  
thew 27:4), "I have sinned in that  
I have betrayed the innocent blood."

Mary Baker Eddy tells us (Mes-  
sage to The Mother Church for  
1902, p. 18), "No estrangement, no  
emulation, no deceit, enters into the  
heart that loves as Jesus loved." And  
she adds, "It is a false sense of  
love, that, like the summer brook,  
soon gets dry."

When therefore men find that  
they are becoming estranged from  
any one of their friends, they may  
well ask themselves if they are lov-  
ing "as Jesus loved." What is this  
love that Jesus showed to all the  
world? It must have been a univer-  
sal love which recognized no barrier  
of race or creed, and asked only for  
the receptive heart of his hearer. It  
was a forgiving love, which blessed  
even his enemies and persecutors.  
There was no "emulation" in it, no  
desire to succeed at the expense of  
a brother man. There was no deceit  
there, no saying of one thing to a  
man's face and another behind his  
back. There could be no egotism,  
which delights in the downfall of  
friend or enemy; no political schem-  
ing to put one's self ahead, regard-  
less of the interests of others. No,  
the love of Jesus was pure and holy,  
a reflection from his Father in  
heaven; and it blessed friend and  
foe alike. Mrs. Eddy asks (ibid., p.  
18), "Beloved, how much of what he  
did are we doing?" It is a pregnant  
question.

Christian Science teaches how we  
can enter into the holy of holies  
and learn the secret of the "way"  
that Jesus pointed out. It reveals to  
us that since evil is essentially  
unreal, there is no cause for alarm  
when our friends seem to fall us.  
There is one friend who is always  
constant and always available, and  
this friend is the Christ.

It is true that in this world we  
shall constantly find differing in-  
terests and differing values, but the  
true Christian Scientist knows that  
his interests and his values are de-  
termined by what he knows of the  
truth of his own being. He knows  
that he is in reality a son of God,  
and that estrangement is unknown  
to his Father which is in heaven.

As he learns these vital truths he  
will find that the standards set by  
the world are far below those of the  
Christ; and it is the standard of  
Christ which concerns him. Then  
he will not be so apt to fret himself  
over worldly issues, or to condemn  
his friends for differing with him  
on more or less temporary concern.  
He will face the evils of society with  
a stronger trust in the power of  
good to overcome evil, because he  
knows that the latter has in reality  
no power or existence. Day by day  
he will learn to turn more and more  
wholly to God for all his happiness  
and his content.

As he does so he will find that he  
does not become estranged from his  
true friends, nor indeed from so-  
ciety. He will be able to maintain  
his own mental position without of-  
fending those who do not wish to  
take offense, and his influence for  
good will be in proportion to his  
demonstration of the allness of God  
and the nothingness of error.

If any of us have seemed, there-  
fore, to have become estranged  
throughout the years from friends  
or relatives, let us remember what  
Mrs. Eddy says on page 131 of "The  
First Church of Christ, Scientist,  
and Miscellany," "Where God is we  
can meet, and where God is we can  
never part." God is everywhere,  
and each loving heart can enter  
here and now into His kingdom and  
partake of His blessings. Each one  
can know that in "the mind of  
Christ" there is no sense of separa-  
tion or of defeat or unkindness, and  
that it is within the power of every  
one to prove in a degree the truth of

the Master's saying (John 12:32).  
"And I, if I be lifted up from the  
earth, will draw all men unto me."  
As we manifest the Christ-qualities  
we shall draw others to the Christ  
until we see at last the full unity of  
the Father and the son.

## CENSUS BUREAU REPORTS 20% DECREASE IN AUTO DEATHS

Automobile fatalities in 128 major  
cities during the first quarter of  
this year dropped 20 per cent under  
the 1937 toll for the same period,  
according to reports made public by  
Director William L. Austin of the  
Bureau of the Census, Department  
of Commerce.

Deaths from motor vehicle ac-  
cidents reported by the 128 cities  
during the first three months num-  
bered 1,978 compared with 2,479  
last year. Eleven of the reporting  
cities have not had a fatality this  
year caused by an accident within  
the reporting period.
