STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

Cattle Market

The cattle market at north Portland declined somewhat last week, but showed an improved tone last Monday when the arrival of approximately 1700 head was characterized by moderately active trading and a rise in prices of around 25c over last week's close.

Good light grain fed steers brought \$8.75, sorted. A fairly good dried sold at \$8.15. California grass fed steers averaging around 975 pounds brought \$8.00. The San Francisco trading was slow on Monday, with medium quality grass steers bringing \$7.15 to \$7.25.

The Chicago market has been relatively strong compared to those on the coast. On Monday medium weight and heavy steers at Chicago brought a top of \$10.65. All markets still report an unusually small spread between the prices of slaughter cattle and stockers and feeders. The strong demand for replacement cattle, as a result of abundant feed supplies and good summer ranges, has kept the price high for this class of stock.

Imports of cattle and calves during the first three months of this year were about 38 per cent smaller than in the corresponding period of 1937. This was caused partly by the relatively greater decrease in prices in this country than in Canada. The relatively smaller decline in prices at Winnipeg probably was a reflection of the sharp reduction in cattle feeding in western Canada, caused by scarce, high-priced feed last year. Imports of canned beef in the first quarter of 1938 were 3 per cent larger than in the first three months of last year, but imports of fresh, pickled and cured beef were smaller.

Sheep and Lamb Markets

After the disastrous price drops on lambs of the past week or so, the market in Portland last Monday was active, with quotations on spring fully 25c higher than on the Friday before. Good spring lambs from among the total of 2250 head of sheep and lambs received, sold mostly at \$6.75, while a few old crop lambs went at \$3.50 to \$5.

About the same situation prevailed at San Francisco, where prices were up 25c from Friday. Eighty-pound, California woolled lambs brought \$7.50. In California most of the training last couple of weeks has been confined to loadings for the middle west. Part of these were woolled lambs, although some short lambs and yearlings and many shorn ewes were available. Shipment of 21,000 head out of California brought a total movement to date of \$421,000, or about 18 per cent greater than in the comparable period last season.

Prices of early spring lambs in the east during May averaged considerably lower than in May, 1937. This was largely caused by the weakness in consumer demand for meats, coupled with the relatively low prices of pelts. Marketings of new crop lambs during the summer months are expected to exceed those in 1937. On the other hand, marketings of yearlings from Texas are expected to be slower than the record movement of a year ago.

Hog Markets

Hog prices were about 25c higher on Monday than at the close of the previous week, with carload lots of good to choice light butchers selling up to \$8.75. Prices at the close of last week were down about 75c compared with the start of the week. Although the number of hogs on feed in the east is reported to be considerably less than average, slaughter supplies of hogs during the summer will be larger than of last summer.

Storage stocks of pork on the other hand, were the second small-

est on record as of May 1. The decrease in the quantity of hog products in storage is roughly equivalent to the products obtainable from about 2,100,000 hogs of average market weight.

Wool Markets

Not much change in the slow trading that has featured the Boston wool market in recent weeks was observable this past week. Prices are reported to have eased up some in number of the large producing areas. Trading in graded territory wool was very slow, and the normal quotations were slightly slower as a result of some sales pressure. A few of the larger concerns, however, were unwilling to make concessions from last week's asking prices.

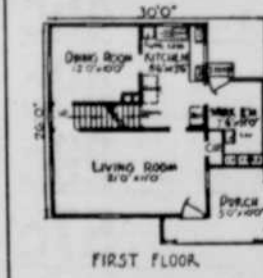
