STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

Cattle Markets

Although cattle receipts at North Portland again last Monday totaled only 1700 head of which 125 were shipped through or direct, trading continued slow on account of a 25c gain in asking prices. Good grain fed steers were listed at \$8.50 and medium grass fat steers at \$7.50 to \$8.00. Common to medium heifers were mostly \$5.25 to \$7.00, although some were held at \$7.25. Offerings at San Francisco Monday consisted entirely of grass steers to sell at \$6.50.

The Chicago market weakened some under bearish reports of the eastern dressed beef trade. Prices on medium and heavy steers remained steady, but other classes

Hog Markets

The hog market at North Portland Monday continued the strength carried over from the previous week. Arrivals of 2000 head were a little greater than a week earlier. Good to choice trucked in light butchers brought mostly \$8.75 and carload lots \$9.00. Packing sows were \$6.00 and \$6.25 and choice feeder pigs \$8.75.

San Francisco reported gains of 20c Monday and Chicago a stronger tone, though little price change. Current prices at all these markets were about \$2.50 less than those on the corresponding date a year ago.

Sheep and Lamb Markets

While arrivals of sheep and lambs at North Portland Monday totaled 3500 head, offerings on the open market were about the same as a week previous as better than a thousand were shipped through. Early sales of spring lambs brought \$7.25, but closing sales were on a basis of \$6.75 to \$7.00. Monday's prices at San Francisco declined 25c with choice 80 pound North coast woolled lambs moving at \$7.50. Eastern lamb markets were weaker with choice spring lambs selling at Chicago at \$9.50.

The movement of California spring lambs to the mid-west is nearing an end with a total of less than 9000 head going last week. Total shipments so far this season however, exceed those of the previous season by about 70,000 head.

Bay district buyers last week were buying north coast full woolled lambs at \$6.50 to \$6.75 f.o.b. ranches. Apparently, total consumption of beef, pork and mutton so far this year is running behind that of last year and also slightly below the five year average. In April, the last month for which figures are available, total apparent consumption was between 95 and 96 per cent of that in April 1937. The total for the first four months, of 1938, however, was only about one per cent less than that for the corresponding period last year. In April, lamb and mutton was the only meat to show increased use as compared with last year, but declining consumption of beef and pork more than offset this. Considering the total for the period from January through April, however, pork and lamb were both consumed more heavily than last year for the same months.

Wool Markets

Monday's spot wool trade at Boston was slow as mills continued to hold off. There was, however, a small to moderate amount of buying direct from the country through Boston houses. Offerings of fleeces throughout the previous week were very light as replacements in the country at prices on a par with Boston spot quotations were becoming increasingly difficult.

In Monday's trade most of the sales involved twelve month Texas wools at prices tending to the high side of the range of 55-57 cents, scoured basis, delivered in the east. Some country packed mixed grade lots of three eighths and quarter blood fleeces sold direct at 42-44 cents, scoured basis, or 23-24 cents in the grease for 45-46 per cent shrinkage.

Foreign wool prices during recent months have shown some strength and the spread between foreign and domestic prices is now less than the United States tariff on wool, thereby reducing imports.
