## Two Minute Sermons

### REMEMBERING GOOD

(written for The Christian Science Monitor)

If we are to go forward fitted for the work before us, should we not be properly prepared? Instead of indulging the human tendency to look back sorrowfully or to think regretfully of the past, we must learn to think scientifically, keeping our consciousness ever true to God, good.

Meditation upon what in the past was good, reminds us that we should render an account of our present stewardship. Should we not recognize the many blessings we all too often take for granted? Since, as Whittier has said,

"That all of good the past hath had  
Remains to make our own time glad."

Let us gladden each day by taking stock of "all of good the past hath had."

Allowing only the good to remain in our thought is a happy service, a grateful prayer of praise. Keeping in our hearts thoughts of the unchanging goodness and omnipotence of God quiets fear and brings new courage, joy, and peace into daily experience. Christian Science, the Comforter which Christ Jesus promised should come, is teaching those who were prone to look with tear-filled eyes at the past to behold, instead, the presence and permanency of good, the immortality of mind, the goodness of God. Thus Christian Science enables all to "give thanks at the remembrance of his holiness" (Psalms 97:12).

Knowing the allness of God, good, brings peace, and peace brings joy proves the presence of good. Remembering God's gift to mankind in the revelation of the Christ, and remembering the message of "on earth peace good will toward men" brings about a purification of heart.

What is it, after all, that makes our days seem unhappy, with spiritual happiness always within our reach? Is it not that God has been left out of our thoughts, and that

Christian Science brings to light the real man and shows by proof in healing that man is Godlike—spiritual, immortal. The material belief that man is mortal must be blotted out of human thought. God's man, having no beginning and no end, must be established in thought, remembered, respected.

Mary Baker Eddy gleaned something of good from every one of her experiences. Out of her rich triumphs came her admonition (The First Church of Christ, Scientist, and Miscellany, pp. 149, 150), "Remember, thou canst be brought into no condition, be it ever so severe, where Love has to be before thee and where its tender lesson is not awaiting thee." The way to turn from sad scenes in memory's lane need not be learned through hard lessons. Only when we cling to grief through self-pity do we miss Love's "tender lesson." Challenging every condition with the question, "What is Love's tender lesson?" will turn our struggling into the giving of thanks to God.

The measure of our progress should be estimated, not by how much we know of Truth, but by how well we live and love it day by day, and by how much we express the spirit of good will toward others. A perfect rule for gracious and happy living is to remember God, good, all the time.

All thoughts that would keep out of our hearts love for God and man must be recognized as enemies to health, happiness, and holiness. Isaiah termed such insidious errors "other lords." Remembering God, remembering that God is with us, brings proof in our day also that those "other lords . . . are deceased, they shall not rise: therefore hast thou visited and destroyed them, and made all their memory to perish" (Isaiah 26:13, 14). How happily we go forward when "all their memory" has perished!

### Fishing Conditions

Seems almost foolish to make a detailed report this week. Fishing is good in every lake and stream that is accessible. The only exception being that every now and then the fish take a couple of days vacation in some of the lakes just to show that they are not subject to the rules laid down by the Chamber of Commerce. However, when this happens, it is only a couple of days until they are again biting as lively as ever.

**Deschutes River**—Fly fishing is very good. Yesterday afternoon a number 12 mosquito fly caught ten rainbows, all over a foot long, between four and six o'clock in the afternoon. Tuesday, D. L. McDaniels of Kimball, Neb., was fishing the Deschutes just below Bend and lost all his tackle to a big fish which, he said, must have been a sturgeon as trout didn't grow that big. We're convinced that he merely hooked one of our eight or ten pound browns. It's always advantageous to lose the big one as then there are no "facts" to cramp your story.

**Metolius River**—Fly fishing is good. If you don't believe it, read the fishing story in this bulletin.

**Crooked River**—Is clear; just beginning to take flies; not too lively yet.

**Paulina Lake**—Here's a story from a California angler that illustrates something that I've been trying to put over for years . . . that fly fishing is the only real trout fishing. This California man said that yesterday he sat in his boat most of the day bait fishing with worms and salmon eggs; that about 5 o'clock p. m., two boats came out and started fishing with flies. Each man in the fly fishing boats took his limit before dark and every fish taken on flies was much larger than those taken by the bait fishermen . . . so try a bucktail coachman at Paulina and enjoy real sport.

**East Lake**—Fishing on fly, troll and bait has been very good the past couple of days after a few days of windy weather which roughened up the lake too much for good fishing. Prospects are excellent for this week end.

**Elk Lake**—Just beginning to rise to flies in the evening. Excellent results are obtained on a medium size tandem spinner baited with worms. Mud Lake also very good.

**Snattle Lake**—Nice rainbows, and an occasional brook are being taken on fly at the upper end of the lake. Some very fine fishing is also being had on some of the nearby lakes, Blue, Square, Long and Round.

**Diamond Lake**—Last week end was a banner period for big fish. H. A. Bork of Corvallis took a 10½ pound rainbow, which topped the 7 lb. 5 oz. one taken by Guy Churchill of Marshfield the week before. A Dave Davis spinner with worms is

### NOT BAD NOW

With wheat crowding the four-bit mark, wool selling at 15 cents a pound, beef, mutton and butterfat at low ebbs, some are inclined to become discouraged. For that reason it appears appropriate that the following article on hard-times which has recently been quoted nationally would be in order for publication:

"It is a gloomy moment in history. Not for many years—not in the lifetime of most men who read this—has there been so much grave and deep apprehension never has the future seemed so incalculable at this time.

"In our own country there is universal commercial prostration and panic, and thousands of our poorest fellow-citizens are turned out without employment, and without the prospect of it.

"In France the political caldron seethes and bubbles with uncertainty; Russia hangs as usual, like a cloud, dark and silent upon the

favorite lure. Roads are now open to Big Camas, Kelsey Valley and Thorn Prairie so stream fishing is available. Roads in Diamond from both U. S. 97 and 99 are in perfect condition.

Crescent Lake—Crescent lake is a rival of Diamond for big rainbows. Even novices are taking some fine rainbows on spinner and worms.

**Oddell Lake**—Fly fishermen are taking limit catches of rainbows but the fish are not running overly large. Trolling is not producing so many fish but they average much larger.

**Miller Lake**—Limit catches of nice size rainbows are being made on spinner and worms. No boats available at Miller Lake. You have to "roll your own."

**Gold Lake**—Good fly fishing. A one mile walk from the "head of navigation" for a car. Oddell Lodge has boats on the lake for rent.

**Here's That Fishing Story That I Promised Last Week**

**Fly Fishing**—From a boat on the Deschutes river opposite South Twin is at its very best now. Every one who can cast a fly all is getting his limit from Robideaux boat. The fishing will be good all summer, but later in the season a little science will be necessary to get results.

Went over in the Metolius last Sunday to take some pictures. Left my rod in the car because I find that picture taking and fishing don't work out together any better than cooking a meal and reading a story at the same time (from that statement, you family men will recognize that I have daughter.)

But to get on with my story. Got located directly across the river from some unknown fisherman who was casting a very pretty fly. Took one snap of him casting and settled down to wait till he would hook onto something so I could get some action pictures. All of a sudden his rod bent double and a rainbow almost as big as a salmon came up out of the water. Well sir, I watched that fellow fight that rainbow up and down the bank for 27 minutes before he slipped the net under him. He did a perfect job of handling that fish, but I was so interested in watching the fight that I never snapped a picture. There's your fish story. There are still real fish to be taken from the Metolius if you are a smart angler.

### OUR FISH

During the past week the Malheur Forest Service employees have been busy enlarging and improving the Strawberry camp site at the bottom of the trail leading to the lake. The new camp will take care of more cars and more fishermen. More fishermen will take more fish from this noted fishing lake, until the day comes that there are not enough fish to satisfy these followers of Walton.

There are other lakes tucked away in these mountains from which come fish that are only read about and told about by grandpa. There are still game fish to be caught from these lakes. . . and big ones they are too. . . 12 to 16 inches Eastern Brook trout.

Now we are no piscatorial authorities, but during the past few years there have been few fish planted in Strawberry lake with the environment to survive. . . and fewer still have been planted in the other lakes in Grant county. Just how the game commission expects Grant county to support the herd of fisherman who visit her waters each year is a question only they can answer. With the completion of several of their new fisheries in Oregon they will have available several millions of fish to

be distributed in fishing waters of the state. It is hoped that Grant county will be considered in the allotments.

We realize that the game commission has given this county what they thought was a fair allotment but have they considered that thousands of people from other counties spend their week end holidays fishing in our waters. . . and have they stopped to consider that most of Grant county's 6000 residents sleep with fish poles under their pillows.—The Journal (Prairie City).
