COW HOLLOW

Chuch Share and two CCC boys helped Dale Linbaugh stack his hay the first of the week.

Mrs. Dale Linbaugh returned from Emmett the last of last week. she is feeling much better now.

The boys on the canal work have succeeded in stopping several of the worst leaks on the north bank of Cow Hollow. We are very much pleased with their success as those leaks have been a continuous source of worry to us, we sure don't want another drenching.

The Canal Co. built a foot-bridge across the canal on Russell Howell's place last week. Those foot-bridges are almost a necessity every mile or so on the canal, especially where the canal is on those steep hill sides and the great danger of breaking is these foot-bridges can be used to transport men and light tools across to work on the upper side of the canal, where as before they had to crawl under the canal through those little syphons and often they were wet.

These canal leaks are peculiar and often very hard to find the place where the water goes into the ground to come up on the lower side of the canal bank.

Most of these leaks are cracks in the chalk-rock. The water gets into these cracks were the canal is on a steep hill side and then comes out of the ground below the canal.

If the chalk-rock is firm enough there is no harm done outside of a little loss of water, but if the rock is soft and gradually washes larger until something must be done about it. It is thought that many of these cracks were caused by intensive blasting in the construction of the canal. About the only way to stop those leaks is to find where the water goes into the ground and that is hard to do. One bad one was stopped recently. The patrol man thought he saw a hole in the ground on the opposite side of the canal and reported it. They investigated and found a hole where the water was going into the ground but, there was no seepage spots close. They plugged the hole and almost entirely stopped one of their worst leaks almost 1/4 of a mile away. The water was going into a crack in the chalk-rock then down under the canal and came out at the foot of the canal.

Doc. Rafington will be the first farmer in Cow Hollow to get electric power. The Idaho Power Co., is extending their lines in Sunset Valley, serving about 30 farmers on this new unit. The line will come from the south, on the west road just under the canal, past Paul Ransom's and Ray Rookstool's over Sun Set Pass an ddown to Doc. Rafington's house. That will be the end of the line at present.

John Hamilton at a hay-crew dinner recently said that when he came to Cow Hollow, there was not even a road. He expected they would have a road before too long but he never expected to see electricity here before five or six years.

Hamilton, Doc. Rafington and Mort Wixon were the first people to move into Cow Hollow and that has been only about eighteen months ago. Cow Hollow now has seventeen farm homes, many head of stock, most all the sage brush is gone from the irrigable land and hundreds of acres of crops growing that sure look good to us.

Dude Parker, who lives in the upper end of the Hollow is establishing a 30 mile cream route. He will start from home before 7 o'clock, meet the large truck at Jack Simpson's at 7:30. There he will load empty cans and butter. He will then run his route covering Sun Set Valley and all territory and meet the truck again at 11:30 at the Owyhee ditch and deliver his cans back to the truck.

Some of we Cow Hollowites helped Paul Ransom who lives just over Sun Set Pass, stack his hay. It took him four and a half days to stack it and he has a number of large bents of hay that anyone could be proud of.

Mr. Ransom had just built a new model "A" derrick and we lost some time getting it rigged up and into operation.

We sure enjoy helping the neighbors hay, there is always something happening especially when Roy Rookstool's team run away, and the farm wives all seem to contest to see if they can't prepare more and better dinners than any one else.

Mrs. Wixon helped Mrs. Ransom prepare and serve the dinner to the crew haying at Ransom's.

Many of the new settlers, especially those coming from a few hundred on thousands of miles away, find our ways of doing things somewhat different to what they are familiar with. Take haying time.

Only in the west can hay be piled up in so large stacks with our type of derricks.

Many a new farmer with a first cutting of hay finds himself with a big new hay crop, a big new derrick to stack it and a big crew of new men to use it and not a man on the crew who is familiar with how to operate the derrick and haying outfit.
