VALE—From the banks of Malheur county to the river bottoms of the Snake—from Grant county to Nevada, that cry is echoing and reaching as thousands prepare to celebrate the second, third and fourth of July in the Malheur county seat.

Beginning on the afternoon of July 2nd, until the last firecracker pops sometime in the early morning of July 5, there will not be a dull moment in Vale's great annual celebration. This marks the 20th year since Vale started celebrating the Fourth of July and the committee in charge is making extra efforts to stage the finest show ever presented in Vale.

Robert D. Lytle, again in charge of the rodeo, reports that more riders will be entered than ever. In addition to the usual rodeo features of racing, bulldozing, and bucking contests, the Death Dodgers will stage four spectacular acts each afternoon.

The big parade depicting historical events connected with the nation's founding will again be featured on the morning of July 4. The big free barbecue will also be served at noon on July 4.

Nampa and Wilder will open the baseball series Saturday afternoon with Vale and Nyssa clashing the next day. Winners of both games will compete the final day.

Dancing and dozens of carnival features will be enjoyed each evening.

WHITE TO OPEN WALLOWA LAKE FOR INSTITUTE

Floyd White, pastor of the local M. E. Community church, and family, will leave Tuesday for Wallowa Lake where he will act as camp ground manager, for the Epworth League Institute, which position he has held for the past five years.

The Epworth League Institute will start July 11 and end July 19, with the largest delegation coming from Nyssa which will number 25. This delegation as well as that from Apple Valley and Ontario will make the trip by bus.

Mrs. Reece Byram and Mrs. Dan Corbett will act as chaperones for the group, while Mrs. John Poage will see that the young folks are properly fed while at the institute.

Ruth Bratton has been elected as delegate to the student council, William McElroy as first vice-president of the Institute.

Curtis Foster has been designated as superintendent of transportation.

One of the outstanding accomplishments of this year's institute, according to Mr. White is "the fact that young people can enjoy the eight days at Wallowa Lake for only \$1.50."

PATIENTS FROM ALL SECTIONS VISITS CLINIC

ONTARIO — The crippled children's clinic, held in Ontario last Saturday, drew 39 children and 2 adults, from all sections of the county, according to county health nurse, Mrs. Ferris.

Patients were received from Arock, Jordan Valley, Beulah, and Porters Flat.

Being the first of its kind held in the county, all concerned considered the clinic a very successful one. Most of the patients, it was found, were under treatment by their family physicians.

Those in charge of the clinic were Drs. Elmer Carlson and John Abele, assisted by Misses Bloom and Simpson, and county health nurse Mrs. Ferris.

The doctors in charge of the clinic will make their recommendations to the family physicians of these examined during the clinic, according to Mrs. Ferris.

NEW DIRECTOR TAKES OFFICE ON SCHOOL BOARD LAST FRIDAY

The Nyssa School Board met last Friday evening to hear the report of Superintendent Leo Hollenberg on his trip to Washington in the interests of an addition to the high school building. (The report was given in the last issue of the Journal.)

The newly elected director, A. M. Highsmith was sworn into office by the outgoing clerk, Dwight Smith, who will be succeeded by Bert Lienkaemper. Mr. Lienkaemper is waiting for the arrival of the bond for the school clerk before he assumes active office.

The board instructed Mr. Highsmith to ascertain what the Adrian district planned on doing with their high school student transportation. Since the meeting Mr. Highsmith reports that the Adrian district will continue with the same arrangements as have been carried out in the past.

The Nyssa School board will meet today, with the county non-union high school board at Vale, when it will hold its annual meeting.

SLOT MACHINE CONFISCATED BY STATE POLICE

Sergeant Ted Chambers, of the State Police and Nyssa Police officer A. V. Cook took a slot machine from the G. L. Smith Beer hall last Tuesday night.

Information as to the final disposition of the case was not available from the officer but District Attorney Allen Biggs said that "the operation of slot machines are clearly against the law and my office intends to prosecute all cases presented, but as yet (Wednesday) this case has not been brought to my attention, but you can quote me as saying that the case will be prosecuted if the evidence is placed in my hands."

FIRE CAUSES LOSS TO IDAHO POWER COMPANY

Fire broke out in the sub-station of the Idaho Power company last Friday at 12:45 p. m. causing damage to the extent of about \$10,000 when three large oil transformers were burned out.

Electrical service was disrupted in Nyssa for about four hours, while the lines were being cut over, from the burned out transformers.

Officials of the power company expressed their appreciation to the volunteer fire department for the work they did during the fire.

X-ray pictures of all persons in the area, reacting to the skin test were taken by Dr. J. J. Sarazin and given a preliminary "reading," the pictures being later sent to the Eastern Oregon State Tuberculosis hospital, where Doctor J. O'Dell, superintendent, will again read the pictures and give a final report on each picture sent in.

CITY HALL OPENED WITH DEDICATION CEREMONIES

As a fitting close to the festivities of Owyhee Canyon days the new City Hall was officially dedicated on Saturday evening by Mayor Donald M. Graham.

After this the hall was officially open for inspection where punch and wafers were served in the Mayors rooms to the inspecting crowds. Mrs. Willard Jackson, president of the Civic club and her aides Mrs. George Mitchell and Mrs. William Schireman were in charge of this and presided at the flower decorated punch table throughout the evening.

LOCAL MEN WILL ATTEND PHOSPHATE MEETING JULY 15

O. R. Olsen, Jack Westerfield, and N. E. Dodd, Malheur chairman of the soil conservation committee will go to Pocatello, Idaho to attend a meeting July 15, at which time plans will be made to conserve phosphate beds now in existence and to work out some method that will assure the farmer of getting phosphate at the lowest possible cost. At the present time this fertilizer costs somewhere in the neighborhood of \$2.75 per hundred, where as, according to Olsen, this product can be delivered to the farmer at a cost not to exceed \$20 per ton.

James P. Pope, congressman of Idaho is chairman of a special committee to investigate the possibility of marketing phosphates, Henry A. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture, and Harcourt Morgan, chairman of the Tennessee Valley Administration will also be present at the meeting.

People, interested in the development of the phosphate beds in southern Idaho are urging state control, while private interests are likewise asking for their share of these large deposits, which is one of the matters that will come before the meeting in Pocatello.

GOVERNMENT OFFERS RAILROAD TIES TO SUCCESSFUL BIDDERS

The Owyhee Project of the Bureau of Reclamation has announced that bids will be received at the Boise office of the bureau, July 7, for approximately 1000 chords of used railroad ties, serviceable for fire wood.

Payment for the ties are to be made at the time of removal from the store yard at Dunaway.

Forms for the entering of bids may be obtained at the office of the Reclamation Service, in Nyssa.

CHAMP 'CHUTE ARTIST IN BOISE AIR SHOW



George Cook, daredevil parachute ace, who will thrill the crowds at the Boise Airport Air Show on July 3rd and 4th. Cook, shown here with his pal, "Sweetie," is known as the world's champion parachute jumper. In his spectacular leaps he hurtles through space at the terrific speed of 165 miles an hour, falling close to 10,000 feet before opening his parachute. Cook's record leap is 17,000

feet—more than three miles—before opening his 'chute.'

Besides Cook and Rankin the show will feature such well-known stars as Dorothy Barden, women's champion parachute jumper, Al Lary, called "the world's craziest pilot," Captain Bill Royle, flier-actor-announcer, and master of ceremonies at the Boise meet.
