TO WHICH CLAN, PROFESSOR— COMMUNIST OR BUND?

NEWSPAPERS throughout the country, the first part of this week, carried a story in which Professor Gellerman, of Northwestern University charged that the American Legion was "Fascist" and unpatriotic, the charge being delivered at the annual convention of the National Education association.

It has been our privilege of being a member of the American Legion for a number of years—and during that time we have never once heard a remark passed by any member of the Legion that is either Fascist or unpatriotic. If the professor's remarks were based on the pledge of the Legion to 'Uphold and defend the constitution of the United States and to Maintain Law and Order, and to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation', then he brands himself as being either a communist or a nazi—both of which would tear down the American Flag and scrap our constitution.

It is such people as he, and Bridges that should be sent back to either Russia or Germany. And we cannot for the life of us see why, if these other forms of government are so wonderful, why they stay in the United States.

The preamble to the Constitution of the American Legion is no secret, is repeated by the entire membership at the beginning of each meeting and is published here for the information of our readers. "For God and Country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes: To Uphold and Defend the Constitution of the United States of America: To Maintain Law and Order; to Foster and Perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to Preserve the Memories and incidents of our association in the great war; to Inculcate a sense of obligation to the Community, State and Nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to Make Right the master of Might; to Safeguard and Transmit to Posterity the Principles of Justice, Freedom and Democracy; to Consecrate and Sanctify our Comradeship by our Devotion to Mutual Helpfulness."

LET'S CUT THE FIRE INSURANCE COST

In most cases compulsion is not necessary, and to help those that realize the necessity of fire protection during the time that the weeds are being burned off, Commissioner of Public Safety Burbidge has offered citizens that protection by having the fire truck present while weeds are being burned off. All that is necessary is to make the request.

And while we are on the subject of fire protection, may we offer this suggestion to those who enjoy (?) watching a fire—keep well away from the building that is burning, give our fire department a chance to work efficiently—and do not run your car over the fire hose, remember, it may be your house or property that will be the next that will catch on fire, and you would want to be sure of having the fire hose in good working order.

rest with her family, a day of peace and quietude about the house, with maybe a few hours to read and a few hours to spend in social conversation with neighbors from nearby farms who come in for a little while along in the afternoon. No. So far as the farm woman is concerned all of that is "out." Pass most rural residences nowadays on a Sunday and you'd quickly see why. Lolling about in the yard and playing all over the barnyard you'll see from a half-dozen to a score or more men, women and children, and the two or three often a half dozen autos parked in the driveway, noisy evidence as to why "the good old summer time" isn't so good for the farm wife who is the victim of "city cousins" who have spent a big part of the week figuring out where they could drive to on Sunday for a chicken dinner. Maybe she hasn't laid eyes on them during the fall and winter months. But just as soon as summer approaches she knows her so-called day of rest, and often a big part of her Saturday in addition, is going to be spent in a red-hot kitchen cooking up a big dinner for a lot of people whose friendship always seems to take on a warmer glow as chicken dinner days draw on.

FOR BETTER FISHING

By the end of the year it is hoped to have state fish hatcheries producing 40 million trout annually. Does this mean better fishing, sportsmen wonder; and the answer seems to be: Not in itself.

In the past there has been a missing link between hatchery and game-sized fish. Some sportsmen blame the failure upon poor planting of fish; others upon the lack of feed in streams and lakes. Perhaps both factors contribute to make the hatchery output really ineffective in

Fishing Conditions

After a little cold spell last Friday and Saturday which put a damper on fishing, the weather man has again dished out some nice warm weather and the fish are again working on the surface.

Just to make sure that my judgment was right, I went up on the Deschutes for a couple of hours yesterday morning and caught a nice bunch of rainbows on a mosquito No. 12. They practically quit rising about 10:30. Have not had an opportunity to try the evening fishing the past few days but from catches that have been made in the evening, it would appear that the evening catches average larger in size.

Deschutes River—Good fly fishing along entire river. Mosquito on upper river, bucktail caddis on lower river. Taste of trout subject to change without notice so use your own judgment if you don't get results on the recommended fly.

Metolius River—Excellent catches of large rainbows being made on grey hackle. To get results the Metolius must be fished when the bug hatch is on the water and this time varies from day to day and usually lasts for about two hours.

Crooked River—A number of nice catches of rainbows have been made on flies. No report on fly used but would guess a caddis.

South Twin Lake—Brooks and silvers taken from a lake still run small but excellent catches of rainbows, with a few browns, are being consistently taken from Robideaux' boats on the Deschutes.

Elk Lake—Spinners baited with worms still giving best results. Fair fly fishing in the evening. Mud Lake also very good with excellent fly fishing in the evening. Horses belonging to Cascade-Hike Tours are now located at Elk Lake and are available for an hour's horseback ride or a month's pack trip with an experienced guide. Mr. H. M. Sherwood, the manager of the Cascade-Hike organization, was in the office this morning and reported that yesterday he took a limit catch of large rainbows from Cliff Lake (8 miles from 7lk) in two hours on a fly.

East Lake—Fishing is very good but we get some funny reports. One man gets a limit on worms but can't catch them on troll or fly. The next

conserving our game fish resource.

For this reason it is hoped locally that the effort of sportsmen to sponsor a fish holding pond near Haines is successful. The fish from the hatchery will be allowed to grow larger before liberated and the percentage of survival will be greater. The forced feeding, too, will shorten the time from fingerling to game-sized fish perhaps as much as a year, it is claimed. Then with proper planting of so many fish, if feed is available in the streams and lakes the building up of depleted waters should be a reality.

The present effort is indicative of a need for work by sportsmen themselves toward solving the fish problem. Expensive licenses in themselves do not assure good fishing. Only intelligent study and faithful co-operation by all persons in a position to contribute to factual knowledge of the problem will be successful. Nature gave us the waters and we can build back the fishing.—The Record-Courier.

BOTH GOOD TIMBER

The Oregon electorate may well be congratulated on having two as fine candidates for the office of governor of the state as Henry Hess and Charles Sprague. Both are men of high calibre, of high integrity and high worth. Both have come up from the ranks by energy, perseverance, integrity and ability. Both are young men. Hess 47 and Sprague 50. Hess came into the state as a child, has been educated in the schools of the state from early childhood and is the son of pioneers, whose parents came across the plains, settling in Idaho, only a short distance from Oregon. As a youth and young man he worked in saw mills to pay his way through the schools of higher learning, graduating only a short time before the world war. With the vigor and energy and high purpose of the American youth, he instantly enlisted and in a service overseas went through the grades of non-commissioned officers, finally having charge of ammunition ordinance near the front, perhaps as dangerous a duty as the war afforded. Back from war, he engaged in the practice of law and has found time from his private business to give four years as state senator from Union and Wallawa counties. In the senate he was conspicuous in his work for tax reforms and sponsored legislation for Oregon's first old-age pension law as well as a number of other measures. Roseburg Chieflain.

FACTS FOR DRIVERS

IS IT LAWFUL TO PASS A SCHOOL BUS WHICH IS UNLOADING PASSENGERS?

Yes, it is lawful, but it is a good idea to stop before doing so. The law requires that your speed when so passing must not exceed 15 miles per hour. This rule is an extremely wise one, inasmuch as the passengers on a school bus are often very small children, who are apt to dart out from behind the bus without looking to right or left. Last fall an Oregon school girl was killed in exactly this manner.

Remember, too, that 15 miles per hour is the maximum, not the minimum. You should be traveling slowly enough so that you can stop, if necessary, to permit children to cross ahead of you or to get out of the street.

WHAT ACTIONS CONSTITUTE HIT AND RUN DRIVING?

To avoid successful prosecution on a charge of hit and run driving, a person who has driven a vehicle which has struck another vehicle or pedestrian, must do the following things: He must stop immediately at the scene of the accident, give his name, address and car license number, and the name and address of any other occupant of the car he is driving, to the other persons involved, as well as rendering any assistance necessary to injured persons.

Hit and run driving in which another person is killed or injured entails a much more severe penalty than hit and run driving resulting in property damage only.
