ABOUT FOREST FIRE STARTERS

THE Klamath Free Press reports, editorially, that a man was picked up near the Sand Creek Logging camp, after four forest fires had been discovered.

It is hard for us to comprehend why in the world anyone would want to set fire to a forest—some contend that these forest fires are started by persons wanting work, but with all the relief, P.W.A., W.P.A., Unemployment insurance, and a million other agencies seeing which can dole out the most money, we are forced to the opinion that there is any easier way of working than fighting forest fires.

It is our hope, that the man picked up for setting these fires, if the charges are proven, be given a good long term in jail. Because those forests are not the property, ultimately, of any one firm or individual, but is the heritage of every person living in this country.

And we, living in the city, can do much toward keeping the fire hazards down to the minimum by being careful that the camp fires that we start in the forest are really OUT before we leave them unguarded.

For the past week people living in the Snake River valley have had an opportunity to grasp, in a small way, the terrific amount of damage that must be done by the forest fires in the Pacific northwest, by the sun being almost obscured by the smoke from those fires.

Central Oregon Fishing Conditions

Fishing Conditions

Weather continues to show a maximum daily temperature of 90 to 97. This has caused fishing to slow up in some waters and has materially improved the fishing in other places.

Elk Lake

Everybody fishing Elk Lake has been taking some nice brooks and rainbows but few limits are being taken. Excellent fly fishing is being enjoyed in Mud, Horse and Doris lakes and on the Deschutes between Deschutes bridge and Little Lava lake.

Crescent Lake

Nice catches of average, sixteen inch rainbows being made on trout oreno and on spinner and worms.

Odell Lake

Has slowed up somewhat from last week. Some nice catches still being made trolling.

Davis Lake

Is open to fly fishing only and the fishing has been materially improving during the past week.

Three Creek Lake

Trolling has been reasonably good with some fly fishing in the evening.

Important Information for the Fisherman

We have told you that we have in excess of 150 lakes tributary to Bend. The program for stocking this year, prepared by the Deschutes County Sportsmen's Assn., provides for stocking 156 lakes. There are at least 6 lakes that are already amply stocked, making a total of at least 162 lakes that can be conveniently fished from Bend.

Mestollus River—Here's your weekly fish story that gives the facts: Loyd Blakley of the City Drug store of this city and his wife fished one hole in the Metolius for an hour last Sunday, between four and five o'clock, hooped eight fish and landed nine. Pretty good fishing, eh? Here's how it happened—Loyd hooped a ten or eleven inch rainbow; a 19 1/2 inch Dolly Varden grabbed onto about four inches of the rainbow's tail and hung on.

Diamond Lake—My reports from Diamond get in the day after this guide is published. Don't know whether the mail is slow or whether George doesn't start it our soon enough.

East Lake—Trout oreno seems to be producing better results than anything else. Some being taken on worms and on spinners and worms.

Paulina Lake—The fish have apparently slowed up somewhat, presumably as a result of the warm weather. You can still catch plenty to feed the family and they are

shooting down many does after finding how like it is to shooting Farmer Brown's pet cow. The sport of hunting and the set of horns is what they are after.

The fears expressed that an open season as mentioned above would seriously endanger the deer supply in Grant county are unfounded.

Most of the hunters who will take a few days from their work, spend several dollars for a license, ammunition, hunting equipment, drive hundreds of miles and endure all kinds of hardships for one deer, have a speck of sporting blood in their veins, and are unlikely to
