STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the Government leased market wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State college. The material is in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market and is not intended to replace spot day by day market reports.)

Cattle Markets

Cattle arrivals picked up somewhat in Portland on Monday when approximately 2000 head were received compared with 1500 the Monday before, and only 1925 of the entire week. The market was moderately active and about 25 cents higher than last week's close. Highest prices on a few loads of the best steers was \$8.50, which was also the top price received last week for a load of good 916-pound grass steers.

The recent partial recovery in cattle prices followed two weeks of excessive supplies. At San Francisco this trend was not noticeable as most bids on Monday were weak to 25 cents lower than last week. Several loads of fed steers held above \$8.50.

Livestock markets in the east recently have reflected the unfavorable effects of high temperature and excessive humidity on the wholesale meat trade. Prices of stocker and feeder cattle in the east have been higher than last week, probably due to the more favorable feed situation. A seasonal down-turn in prices of stocker and feeder cattle usually occurs in the mid-west in late August or early September and continues well into December.

This year total movement of stocker and feeders in the 12 large middle-western markets for the first three weeks of July was about 20 per cent above that of the same period last year. Prices paid for the last week of this period were about the same as a year ago.

Sheep and Lamb Markets

Sheep and lamb arrivals at North Portland last Monday amounted to 3350 head compared with 2700 the Monday before, although the total shipments last week reached 6,000 head, a good many of which were bled through, however.

After ending about even last week the market started in on Monday steady to 25 cents higher. Good \$6.25 to \$6.50, although some sold up to \$6.75. One carload from eastern Oregon topped the market at \$7.00.

In central Oregon a few sales of feeder lambs were reported the past week for shipment into California at around \$6.25 a hundred. In the inter-mountain area very little contracting was reported as bids are lower than growers are willing to accept.

Sales of breeding stock are reported from California as growers shape up next season bands. Yearling ewes have brought \$7.00 to \$7.50 per head with two-year olds going at \$7.50 to \$8.00 and three-year olds \$8.50 to \$7.00. (Note these prices are per head and not per hundredweight as is the case with slaughter lambs.)

Shipments of feeder lambs during the first three weeks of July from the 12 large mid-west markets totaled nearly 66,000 head or about 50 per cent greater than during the same period in 1937.

Hog Markets

Hog receipts at North Portland last Monday amounted to 1900 compared with 2400 head the Monday previous and just over 3000 for the entire week. The market was uneven with most sales 15 to 25 cents under last week's close. Light butchers brought \$9.00 to \$9.10 compared to a high point of \$9.75 for carload lots early last week.

The hog supply last week was about the same as in the corresponding week a year ago. The weakness in hog prices is in line with the normal seasonal trend.

Wool Markets

Slightly less activity characterized the Boston wool market last week although a slow trade occasioned no marked weakness in prices. Territory wools sold much slower than the previous week with holders willing to grant some concessions on original bag lines. Good French combing length,

fine territory wools in original bags could not be moved readily at prices over 65 cents, scoured basis. Odd lots were available occasionally below this.

The official government estimate on the size of the United States wool crop for 1938 is about 368,500,000 pounds. This is approximately 2 million pounds more than last year's crop which was about average. The large crop is accounted for by the fact that about 1.3 per cent more sheep were shorn this year than in 1937.

INITIATIVE LISTED FOR STATE BALLOT IN FALL ELECTIONS

SALEM, Ore.—Thirteen measures will be on the state ballot next November. Four of the number are measures that were referred to the voters by the last legislature. Two others are enactments of the last session which have been referred by petition of the people. The other seven are initiative measures. Three of these made the grade during the closing hours of filing Thursday of last week.

The list of initiative measures on which the voters will be expected to pass judgment follows:

Stream Purification bill creating state sanitary authority and committing state to a policy of stream purification; sponsored by Stream Purification League of Oregon.

Anti-picketing and anti-boycott bill, defining labor disputes and regulating picketing and labor boycotts; sponsored by Associated Farmers of Oregon and other agricultural groups.

Columbia River Fishing bill, prohibiting the use of fixed fishing gear on the Columbia river; sponsored by Oregon Wildlife Council.

Anti-liquor bill, regulating and restricting sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes; sponsored by Anti-Liquor League of Oregon and affiliated groups.

Gambling bill, legalizing certain forms of lottery and gambling; sponsored by Frank B. Watson and a group of Oregon merchants.

Townsend Recovery Plan bill, requiring Oregon legislature to petition Congress to call national convention to sponsor a constitutional amendment embodying principles and philosophies of Townsend Recovery plan; sponsored by Glen C. Wade and others.

Citizens' Retirement plan, providing for transactions tax of two percent, proceeds to be pro rated among Oregon citizens 65 years of age or over upon condition that they cease gainful employment, sponsored by Elbert Eastman, Portland.
