COW HOLLOW By The Happy Farmer

Chet Sage has threshed his wheat and is now hauling it to Nyssa for storage. Altho Chet's wheat made about 50% more than he expected when he went to town to see about selling it he found that if he sold it all it would bring his \$132. His thresh bill and expense was \$50 leaving him the huge sum of \$82 for binding and his own labor putting in the wheat and irrigating it all summer and for his seed expense.

We farmers can't understand what happened to our grain market. The Niccum boys have completed cutting their barley and weeds. Eliza says he has Doc Rafington's binder trained until it fairly eats those thistles. Some of the rest of us would like for him to use our binder for a while too.

The water melon stealing season is now on again and it would seem that the boys are getting off to a good start in our district.

Sunday morning Paul Ransom, who lives over Sun Set Pass from Cow Hollow, came down the Cow Hollow road and we ask him where he was going so fast, for he was looking down and watching the road which is very unusual for him for he usually enjoys a talk with a neighbor. He stopped for a very few minutes and this was the story he told. He has a small family sized melon patch and Saturday night some boys with a team hitched to a two wheeled trailer called upon his melon patch. It seems they loaded all the melons of any size in to the trailer and hauled them to the top of the hill. The moon was bright and from there they could watch the road both ways and there they bursted about 30 of Paul's melons which was all green.

Sunday morning Paul had discovered the mischief and it was easy to follow the track of the trailer for it had one flat tire and the wheels were extra wide apart. We haven't heard what happened when he came to the end of the trail.

Most of us would not care for the boys getting a few melons to eat for of course a stolen melon tastes better than if we had given it to him, but we would rather they would not destroy the patch for some one else might want to get some melons too.

We heard a farmer yesterday say there were two things he would steal and that was whiskey and water melons but he would not destroy the patch.

Doc Rafington's relatives have returned to their homes in Oklahoma but before they left two of them located themselves farms out here so we expect them to return next summer to be pioneers with the rest of us.

We new land farmers are all short of farm machinery so we have to borrow and loan together, by so doing we get our crop put in raised and harvested. A while back Jim Trimmel borrowed a potato digger from Eliza Niccum. A few days ago Chuck Share, knowing the digger was at Jims came over and asked Eliza if he could use the digger too. Upon going after the digger he found another neighbor had come after it and it had been moved till it was now six miles north of Nyssa or about 20 miles from home. We don't mind loaning our tools but they should be brought home when done with them so the owner would at least know where they are.

A party of young people went to the dam Sunday. That is a very nice trip for anyone not familiar with the mountain scenery but we will all be glad when the CCC boys get the road up the Owyhee river completed that will be a shorter and much more level road and there will still be plenty of very nice scenery too.

There was a party of surveyors and engineers out Monday and Tuesday working on our road proposition so we hope to see construction started on our roads under the new road bonds soon.
