MERCHANTS WARNED ON SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER CARDS

SALEM, Ore. — Warning that commercial transactions carried on solely through identification by social security account number cards are risky business was issued today by state unemployment compensation commission officials.

These numbers have no significance beyond use as identification of wage accounts set up under state unemployment compensation agencies and the federal old age insurance setup and should not be accepted by merchants as identification by persons who seek to open accounts or have checks cashed, officials said.

Neither should social security account number cards be regarded by employers as evidence that young

persons may be hired in accordance with child labor requirement, the warning continued.

Cards frequently are lost or stolen and might easily come into the hands of the unscrupulous, it was pointed out.
