STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

CATTLE MARKETS

Cattle receipts on the North Portland market on Monday amounted to 3200 head, which was 200 less than a week ago, when 3400 were received. The market opened rather slow, with prices down 25c on most classes. The top price on steers was \$8.25, as compared with a top of \$7.75 both last week and the week before.

The Chicago market was fairly active, with prices up 15 to 25 cents from last Friday. While fed steers sold as high as \$12, the bulk of the better grades brought \$10.50 to \$11.75.

The number of cattle on feed for market in the corn belt states on August 1 was about 12 per cent larger than a year earlier, the latest reports of the bureau of agricultural economics show. In the eastern corn belt, a 17 per cent increase was indicated, but in the western portion only an 8 per cent increase was in sight. A large carryover of feed from the 1937 harvest is on reason for the expected increase in cattle feeding.

In Nebraska and Kansas, however, the supplies of old feed are far below normal, which is reflected in the fact that no increase in the number of cattle on feed is shown in Nebraska this August, while Kansas will actually have a heavy decrease. Cattle feeders expect to purchase somewhat larger numbers of stock and feeder cattle than were purchased a year ago, the report shows.

LAMB MARKETS

The North Portland lamb market was about steady Monday compared with last week's close, but 25c to 50c lower than early last week. The bulk of good spring lambs brought \$12.25, only a few reaching \$6.50.

Trading f.o.b. country points in the intermountain area has been very limited. A few Idaho fat lambs were contracted to Pacific coast packers at \$6.85 a hundredweight and several loads of feeder lambs went to \$6.50 to \$7 a cwt. Contracting in Wyoming was practically at a standstill. Bidding by buyers was on a lower level than most of the prices recently paid, while growers held

for prices equal to those recently realized.

In California, limited supplies of good to choice fat lambs are available from Ladino clover and pastured areas. Buying has been confined to single decks and mostly for immediate needs. In the Ladino clover sections around Oakdale, lambs were moving to southern points about as fast as ready. Current prices on lambs 85 pounds or over around \$7.25, f.o.b. with good smaller weights going at \$6.75. North coast lambs are fairly well cleaned up.

HOG MARKETS

Hog prices at North Portland have been declining rapidly recently with a drop of around 90c a hundred recorded last week. Prices advanced 65c to 75c Monday, however, with good to choice, trucked-in, light butchers bringing mostly \$9, and carload lots sold up to \$9.25. Arrivals were estimated at 2000 head.

The decline in prices at Portland last week was about comparable to the decline in Chicago.

WOOL MARKETS

Wool sold very slowly on the Boston market during the past week, with most buyers appearing to have no urgent requirements to cover and buying only when wool was offered at prices below the general level of quotations.

Most houses asked at least 65c scored basis for good French combing length, fine territory wools in original bags, but small quantities sold at 62c to 63c scored basis. Average to short French combing lengths, fine territory wools in original bags were moved at 60c to 62c scored basis.

RANGE CONDITIONS

Western ranges and pastures were reported in the best condition for August 1 since 1932. The Great Plains sections generally have fair to good feed where range feed was poor a year ago. Feed conditions are generally good in Montana, Wyoming, and Colorado. West of the main divide, high ranges are very good in the Pacific northwest. Utah and Nevada, with a good crop of cured feed in the lower ranges. West of the Cascades in Oregon and Washington, ranges and pastures are very dry. California ranges are in

good condition.

Prospects are that western range cattle will move to market with good weight and finish. There will be little forced marketings due to feed shortages, such as occurred in recent dry years. Sheep and lambs are also in good condition, with present indications that lambs from the range will be heavier, with a larger proportion of fat than last year. Winter sheep ranges have a good growth of feed.
