OUR SCHOOLS

WITH the bond and union district election over, both of which measures carried, we can now go ahead and rectify the situation of an unprecedented growth in enrollment, resulting in overcrowded class rooms.

The union high school district, it is our opinion, offers to the taxpayer's of our sister districts the opportunity of joining with us in the erection and maintenance of a school building that will be a credit to any school district in Eastern Oregon or Western Idaho.

The Nyssa school district will, within the next two years be one of the highest valued districts in the county. To sight a few reasons for our belief—the sugar refinery in our district will be on the tax rolls. And in our city limits we have some where in the neighborhood of \$200,000 in building that will likewise join the refinery on the tax rolls. It has been a jester of the friendliest sort for the directors of the Nyssa district to offer to those of Oregon Trail and Arcadia the opportunity to join in our good fortune.

POOR 'ORPHAN ANNIE'

RECENTLY there has come into our hands pamphlets, issued by the Oregon State Highway Commission, which is sent out to every person in the United States who might tour our state. The purpose behind the issuance of these pamphlets, it is supposed, is to advertise ALL of the state.

In reading through these pamphlets there are a few discrepancies which may not seem of importance to those on the coastal regions of the state but are of importance to us of the "forgotten Oregon." For instance in one of the pamphlets entitled "Drive Oregon Highways" a relief map is shown giving the various highways and cities through which the tourist will travel. Nyssa does not appear on this map—for what reason—carelessness, thoughtlessness or just lack of interest on the part of the Highway Commission to Eastern Oregon? Nyssa has every right in the world to appear on this map. It is in the center of the Owyhee Irrigation district, the Black Canyon district and is the 'home' of a \$2,500,000 sugar refinery, that will bring to the state the equivalent of the cost of the refinery every year. Turning back a page in this same pamphlet, we note a picture of the Owyhee dam, the notation under the picture calling attention to the fact that it is located near Ontario and is reached by U. S. Central Oregon Fishing Conditions Courtesy Bend Chamber of Commerce Oregon Automobile Association

Well, here's a couple of fish stories that will tell the story about fishing conditions better than the routine reports.

Went up to East Lake the other evening and started fishing about 6 or 6:30. Tied on a bucktail coachman and cast out in the lake from the shore. Something grabbed it and started for the middle of the lake, taking out 55 yards of line with my steelhead rod bent nearly double. He went down to the bottom of the lake and wrapped the leader around the weeds. When I retrieved the line, all I had was a handful of weeds wrapped up in the leader, the fly having been broken off. It was a good heavy leader, too. Never got to see the fish but my guess is that he was a big landlocked silverside. Did bring home four 2-pound brook for the evening's fishing, though.

Now here's a story about the big one that didn't get away. The following evening I went up the river with George Bugler of the Shevlin-Hixon company, putting the boat in at Big River bridge. About 6:15 George hooked onto a big loach leaven. He was sure a busy boy for the next 30 to 35 minutes because it was that long before I was able to slip a net under the big boy and lift him into the boat. He weighed just short of 5 pounds. My catch for the evening, with the 35 minutes out that I spent watching George, was four nice rainbows that weighed about a pound apiece.

Unfortunately, I can't fish all the waters and still keep this office running too, so I'll have to give you the other reports as I get them.

Deschutes River—Read the story above and try a bucktail coachman or a spruce fly.

Metolius River—Really good fly fishing if you know your stuff. The rainbows are big and plentiful and are taking a small bucktail caddis.

Elk Lake—Some nice catches are being made by deep trolling with spinner and worms. Fly fishermen are catching all they want in the evening.

Diamond Lake—Experienced fishermen are getting their limit of five fish with little difficulty, whether they troll with trout oreno, wobbler, or spinner and worm, or use flies and even inexperienced fishermen are getting two or three nice ones apiece.

Paulina Lake—The cooler weather is pepping up the fish here and many limit catches are brought in. Take your choice—fish with flies, troll with trout oreno or spinner and worms, or even "tiger fish". You can be assured of plenty of fish.

East Lake—The opening story tells the fly fishing tale. However, some evenings much better results are obtained. Trolling and bait fishing is also getting good results during the day.

Davis Lake—Has been very good during past week. That may be an indication that the coming week may be the best of the season. Your guess is as good as mine.

Crescent Lake—Fair only, with spinner and worms. No report on the fly fishing. Fish must be scared out after Harry Mooney caught the 13 3/4 pound loch leaven last week.

Odel Lake—Good average catches are being made trolling with either trout oreno or spinner and worms. Experienced fly fishermen are taking some nice rainbows on flies.

Sparks Lake—Limit catches of about pound brook still being made on various types of trolls and also on flies morning and evening. No boats available at lake.

Three Creek Lake—It is remarkable how this little lake has kept up with all the fish that have been taken out of it this year. Limit catches still being made on spinner and worms. Fly fishing should be good of an evening but have no report.

Upper Deschutes Below Little Lava Lake—(Open to fly fishing only) The big rainbows are beginning to run up into this area from Crane Prairie now and a number of excellent catches have been made.

reached over Highway 201 and is nearer Adrian than any other city in this region and certainly closer to Nyssa than Ontario.

Certainly no excuse can be attached to such discrepancies and omissions in a pamphlet that is to be distributed for the advertising of Oregon to thousands of tourists, and for which every taxpayer in Nyssa and the whole state pays the bill.

Forecast on Fishing Conditions

This forecast is not based on "second sight" or any scientific information, but merely on my 25 years experience in fishing the waters of Central Oregon.

The brook lakes will close on September 20 and the evening fly fishing will steadily improve up to that time. Trolling will likewise improve but not to the same extent as fly fishing. The streams and rainbow lakes will remain open until October 31 and starting shortly after Labor day we will have some of the wildest rainbow fly fishing to be found anywhere in the world. After the Crane Prairie water is cut off from the Deschutes river we will be hooking a surprising number of both rainbows and browns that will be too big to land and those we do land will be something to brag about for years to come. Fly fishing on the Metolius will also be at its top during September and October. When the nights get too cool for the fish to come to the surface, a small spoon with a fly tied to it will get results and furnish some good sport. Try the fly fishing during the next two months and enjoy some real sport with less competition than will be experienced during any other part of the season.

I note with some interest a communication in your issue of August 18. The article is a little ambiguous but seems to be in opposition to the establishment of a co-operative creamery in Nyssa. Your correspondent apparently prefers to continue patronizing outside creameries, for reasons which he sets forth. As a Nyssa booster, I believe he is wrong. I have nothing but the kindest feelings for the Payette Co-operative creamery.

During the lean years when it would have been impractical to establish a local co-operative it served the farmers of this territory well, to their mutual benefit. In its dealings it was fair and just. But it seems to me that the time has arrived when we are able to fly with our own wings.

In short, that conditions are such that this territory is amply able to support a local creamery, and after all, our first duty is to build up our own community. With the addition of many thousands of acres in the Owyhee project and in a couple of years or so other thousands in the Black Canyon project there is no doubt that a large and flourishing creamery business can be maintained. Also cheap feed in the shape of beet pulp from our \$2,500,000 sugar factory should aid materially in its success. It is up to every community to further its own interest in every legitimate way and without wishing to injure any established business, I believe Nyssa should have a local co-operative creamery.
