Said bonds will be negotiable coupon bonds, will be registered as to principal only by the County Treasurer of Malheur County, Oregon, will each be designed "School Building Bonds" will be dated as of October 1, 1938, will be in the denomination of \$1000.00 each, will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 30 both inclusive, will mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$2000.00 on the 1st day of October in each of the years 1940 to 1964, both inclusive, will bear interest at the rate to be determined, which rate shall be a rate of the lowest responsible bidder, interest payable semi-annually on the 1st day of April and October of each year until maturity and will be payable both as to principal and interest in lawful money of the United States at the office of the County Treasurer of Malheur County, or at the fiscal agent of the State of Oregon in the City and State of New York at the option of the purchaser.
