Mustered Out Next March

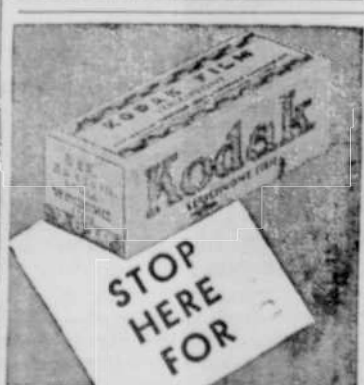
