

#### DO UNTO OTHERS

THIS Saturday the season on Pheasants will open, and with the opening of the season will come the annual 'headache' for the farmer.

To those who plan on hunting pheasants, we think the following procedure would meet with the approval of nearly every farmer, first ask the farmer for permission to hunt on his farm, second find out if there is any stock roaming around loose, third, find out if there are any particular fields that the farmer would not care to have you hunt on, and fourth, the farmer enjoys a nice pheasant for dinner as well as we do!

## THE CITY FOLKS ALSO PAY

A T a meeting of the Interim Commission last week two suggestions were made on the distribution of state revenue.

One was that the cities should share in the revenues from the state highways, at a rate of \$1.50 per capita. The suggestion we believe is justifiable, for the folks in the cities pay their share of the taxes for the maintenance of our highway system, yet comparatively, use it less than those either travelling or living outside the cities. From the state revenues the counties get a proportionate share for county roads. By the same line of reasoning the city governments should be entitled to a fair share of the highway revenues for the maintenance of streets.

The second suggestion was that, the cities should be given a part of the revenues from the liquor revenues of the state. There is one logical argument in favor of this idea. That is the fact that the state assumes very little, if any, of the duties of policing places where liquor, wines or beer is sold. In other words the state places in the incorporated limits of the cities, police problems and then assumes no responsibility for them other than to collect the profits.

Incidently it may be said here, that both of the above suggestions came from the CITY MANAGER of Hillsboro, Mr. McGee.
