BURGLARS BREAK INTO LUMBER OFFICE

SMALL AMOUNT OF CASH TAKEN IN BURGLARY

Loot to the amount of \$25, \$30 in silver in the cash box of the unlocked safe, and stamps and stamped envelopes, valued at \$5, concealed in a cigar box in a counter drawer, was the reward burglars obtained after breaking into the Boise Payette Lumber company office, corner of First Street and Bowler Avenue, some time Sunday night. The theft was discovered by Manager Dwight Smith shortly after his arrival at the office Monday morning at 8 o'clock. The opened lower half of a window just to the right of the office rear door first attracted Smith's attention. Chief of Police A. V. Cook hurried to the lumber company office soon after, but was unable to detect any finger prints left by the thieves or any other evidence to give them a clue.

Evidently the burglar wore gloves when he released the handle bars of the two doors to the office safe. The cash drawer was pulled open and closed after the money was taken, but the books, papers and other office supplies in the safe were undisturbed.

The thieves apparently left the office the same way they obtained entrance, through the window. A pane in the upper half of the window, just above the latch, had been broken and the latch released. Lifting the lower window was a matter of but a few moments.
