**COW HOLLOW**  
Well the water is gone out of the canals. Some of us have stock water and some of us don't. Some of us have small cisterns that will water stock for two or three months but before the stock water comes in the canal again many of us will be spending one fourth of our time hauling it.

Elza Niccum has by far the largest cistern in Cow Hollow. It is about ten feet deep and about 10

feet across all the way down. Most of us had difficulty in digging them. Very little rock but most all of us had to dig in a hard subsoil and many of us had to use a pick most of the way down.

Most of the cisterns were made in the bottle neck form. A bottle neck cistern is more resistant to frost in winter and heat in summer. There is less to cover too and who wouldn't rather drink out of a bottle anyhow?

Elza's is the only one in Cow Hollow that was soft easy shoveling all the way down. He dug it on the southeast side of a bank and the S. E. side of a steep bank up close to the big canal most of the time means a deep, soft, sandy loam. He started his cistern a bottle neck type but when he had got down eight feet he came back the next morning it all had fell in so now he has straight walls.

His walls falling in gave him so much more dirt to shovel that it put him behind until he had to work most of the night Tuesday getting his cistern finished after the canal gate at the Owyhee dam had been shut down Tuesday morning. The canal will run down soon enough that he will get his cistern full, but will it hold being filled so soon while the cement is so soft?

Sam Cates' son and family arrived in Cow Hollow last week. He and wife were out here a year ago and liked the country so well that this fall they have sold their possession in Oklahoma and now are out here to get them a new home in a new land.

What has become of our western hospitality? Last week we were

coming home rather late when we picked up a man walking down the road. When he went to get out, for he was a new land farmer this is the story he told us.

He was walking four miles morning and night to the Desert ranch and picking spuds all day. He had worked a week and one day and said we were the first one that ever stopped to give him a ride. We asked him if he were out so early and late that no one was on the road? He said no dozens of them past

him up. Now days we travel so fast that it takes about one half a minute and so! so much trouble to stop and pick up a poor man that has to walk and besides he might knock in our heads and take our car.

Some times we are glad our old wreck of a car won't run very fast and our time isn't so valuable and the old car isn't worth stealing and there isn't one in a thousand walking on a back-country road that would do that anyway.
