LIBERALISM VS CONSERVATISM

ABOUT this stage of every political campaign we hear a lot about the "other fellow" being a conservative or liberal.

We wonder about those terms, as applied to politicians. To be branded as a conservative seems to be the worst mark of degradation that can be bestowed upon a political opponent. As a matter of fact a conservative, according to the accepted term given it by the dictionary, is one who believes in the conservation of present institutions or forms of government. We see nothing wrong with a man or woman who wishes to continue our present form of government or institutions.

Liberalism, from the dictionary, indicates a person not servile or mean, having a tendency toward Democratic or Republican, as distinguished from monarchical or aristocratic, forms. The two terms, then, are not so far apart.

NOT ALWAYS AS BLACK AS PAINTED

IN our main news section a story is carried about a voluntary reduction in electric rates by the Mountain States Power Company, in the Willamette valley.

This reduction in rates is the direct result of a request by the company to the Utilities commission in Salem, and proves again the fallacy of branding all power companies as a growing cancer in our everyday life. True, there are cases in which the power companies may be accused of excessive rates, and it is upon these few cases that the political opportunist draws the red herring across the path of clear thinking on the part of the consumers of electrical energy.

And on the financial side of the picture there remains the fact that most power companies are owned, in a large part, by people in the everyday walk of life, ordinary folks, like the rest of us. Their average small investments represent savings of these ordinary folks, a savings upon which they hope to realize a return somewhat larger than if on deposit drawing a very small interest rate.

And in addition, it must be borne in mind, that these public utilities companies pay taxes—something that as yet the governmental utilities do not do. In our own home territory, the Idaho Power company pays, in various taxes, 22 cents out of every dollar collected from the consumer!

No, the power companies are not always as black as they are painted.

A MAN WORTHY OF THE JOB

WE believe that Charles Marshall should be elected County commissioner, at the November election.

Mr. Marshall is a man well suited, in temperament, to sit on the county court. He is fair minded, does not believe in sectionalism, and believes that what will benefit one part of the county will benefit all of the county. Said bonds will be negotiable coupon bonds, will be registrable as to principal only by the County Treasurer of Malheur County, Oregon, will each be designated "School Building Bonds," will be dated as of October 1, 1938, will be in the denomination of \$1000.00 each, will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 30 both inclusive, will mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$2000.00 on the 1st day of October in each of the years 1940 to 1954, both inclusive, will bear interest at the rate to be determined, which rate shall be a rate of the lowest responsible bidder, interest payable semi-annually on the 1st day of April and October of each year until maturity and will be payable both as to principal and interest in lawful money of the United States at the office of the County Treasurer of Malheur County, or at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in the City and State of New York.
